POTTER.—Miss Lucy Marla Potter passed away Thursday afternoon at the home of her brother, James H. Potter, in Bellefonte, following a brief illness of pneumonia. She was born in Bellefonte 80 years ago, and lived there all her life.

She is survived by a brother, James H. Potter, with whom she made her home, and a sister, Miss Thomazine Potter, of Elkings Park.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at the home of Mr. Potter, Rev. Wm. C. Thompson, pastor of the Bellefonte Presbyterian church, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery.

JOHNSON.—John Curtis Johnson died at his home in Bellefonte Thursday evening, following an illness of three weeks with hardening of the arteries. He was born at Hecla, 79 years ago. He followed farming for several years, later engaging in the draying business which he followed for 46 years, retiring two years ago.

He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Charles Smith, State College; Mrs. Oscar Lenebarger, Pleasant Gap; Miss Hannah Johnson, and Mrs. Robert Gehret, at home. A brother and two sisters also survive: Milton R. Johnson, and Mrs. W. C. Coxey, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Ella Hendricks, of Coon Rapids, Iowa. He is also survived by five grandchildren. Mr. Johnson was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and of the Bellefonte lodge P. O. S. of A.

Funeral services were held at the home Monday afternoon, in charge of Rev. Edgar Heckman, with burial in the Union cemetery.

THOMAS.—Rev. Joseph Thomas, pastor of the Port Matilda Baptist church, died suddenly at 5:10 Friday evening at the Phillipsburg State hospital from a heart attack.

Rev. Thomas was recuperating from a heart ailment at the institution and was on the road to recovery. He was stricken and died within ten minutes.

She is survived by her mother, who is 84 years of age, her husband and the following sons and daughters: John Dean, of Bellefonte; Earl, of Norristown; Mary, of Polk; Harrison, Ray, Irene, Kenneth and Anna, at home. She is also survived by a sister and two brothers, Mrs. James Bailey, of Port Matilda; Oscar Colyer, of Mill Hall, and David, of Norristown.

CORL.—Mrs. Elsie Corl, wife of J. Clayton Corl, of Ferguson township, was stricken with a heart attack while washing the dinner dishes at 12:15 o'clock on Wednesday of last week, and died before a doctor could be summoned.

She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Krebs and was 65 years old. She married Mr. Corl 45 years ago and he survives with no children. She leaves however, two brothers and a sister: O. B. Krebs, of Altoona; Orin, in California, and Mrs. Alma Reed, of Pine Grove Mills. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon by the Rev. J. S. English, with burial in the Pine Grove Mills cemetery.

LAWYER SAMUEL D. GETTIG DIES AT SEVENTY YEARS

Samuel David Gettig, one of the leading attorneys of the Centre County Bar, died suddenly at his home in Bellefonte Saturday evening. Mr. Gettig had been in ill health but had been able to attend to his law practice. When his son, Musser, returned home Saturday evening, he found his father sitting on a chair and upon approaching him found he had passed away. He was born in Miles township, seventy years ago.

He received his early education in the Spring Mills schools, and later attended the Central Normal school, at Danville, Ind. Mr. Gettig taught in the district schools of Centre county, two years in the Boalsburg High school and one year in the Milesburg High school. It was while he was engaged in teaching that Mr. Gettig read law with J. C. Meyer, Bellefonte, and was admitted to the Centre County Bar.

January 1, 1898, Mr. Gettig became chief clerk for Orvis, Bower & Orvis, attorneys-at-law, and remained with the firm until January 1, 1905, when he organized the firm of Gettig, Bower & Zerby, which succeeded Orvis, Bower & Zerby. Upon the resignation of Mr. Zerby the firm was continued as Gettig & Bower until 1931 when Mr. Gettig's son, Musser Wm. Gettig, was taken into partnership under the firm name of Gettig & Gettig. Mr. Gettig was a member of the Supreme and Superior Court Bars of Pennsylvania, the District Court, and the Circuit Court of Appeals of the United States, and on October 10, 1932, he was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States. He was a Democrat in his political connections, but never aspired to office.

Mr. Gettig served in the National Guard for 18 years as a member of Company B, 5th Regiment. He became a sergeant and was later promoted to the rank of captain during the Spanish-American war, stationed at Chickamauga, Ga., and Lexington, Ky.

January 18, 1902, he married Miss Annie M. Kerstetter, of Pleasant Gap, who preceded him in death six years ago. A son, Musser Wm. Gettig, at home, and a daughter, Mrs. Reed O. Steely, of Lemoynre, survive. He is also survived by the following brothers and sisters: J. Andrew Gettig, Green trees; Henry, George and John Gettig, of Bradocks; Mrs. G. R. Owens, of Traer, Ia.; Mrs. Harry Ishler, of State College, and Mrs. Frank Sharp, of Lemoynre.

Brief funeral services were held at the home Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 for the relatives, and services were continued at the Evangelical church at 2 o'clock, in charge of the pastor, Rev. A. Ward Campbell, with Masonic rites at the cemetery. Burial was made in the Union cemetery.

The Bar Association of Centre county appointed a committee composed of Ellis L. Orvis, N. B. Spangler, W. Harrison Walker, James C. Furst and John G. Love, to formulate a minute and resolutions, which was done at a meeting held on Monday.

GARDNER.—Mrs. Ella M. Gardner died at her home at Rock Springs on Saturday afternoon of illness due largely to her advanced age. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon with burial at Bellefonte, Rev. Brown, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating.

Mrs. Gardner was a daughter of John and Sarah Rider Goheen. There are no children living, and the husband died a number of years ago. She is survived by a brother, R. G. Goheen, of Bellefonte, one of ten children. She was aged 82 years, 6 months, 6 days.

GRAY.—Irvin G. Gray, of Half Moon Valley, died in the Phillipsburg hospital, Saturday evening. He was aged about sixty-three years. He is survived by these children: George and Clyde, of Pittsburgh, and Pearl, Ruth and Helen, all married and residing in Philadelphia. Three sisters also survive: Mrs. M. A. Elder, of Phillipsburg; Mrs. Bella Mattern, of Half Moon Valley, and Mrs. Wm. K. Foster, of Orlando, Florida.
