Historical Facts

[Under this head will appear one or more historical facts of local interest, to a large extent taken from Linn's History of Centre and Clinton counties, designated for reference as L. H., the figures following indicating page. The "Notes," if any, are those of the editor.]

General Potter's second wife was Mary, widow of Chambers, daughter of James and Mary Patterson, of Fernmenagh township, now Juniata county. She died in 1791 or 1792, in Penns Valley, and was buried in the old Stanford or Cedar Creek graveyard, near Linden Hall.—L. H., page 463.

Note.—This little cemetery is on what is known as the Geise farm, where the road to Linden Hall and the Earlstown road intersect. There are a number of prominent old settlers buried there, among them the older generation of Boals.

In 1805 the land for a church and burial purposes was purchased at Centre Hill of Alexander Johnston. In 1845 an additional plot of ground was purchased of John Spangler, and a brick church erected by Presbyterians at a cost of \$5,500. Dr. Robert Hamill became the pastor in 1846.—L. H., pp. 404, 405.

Note.—John Spangler was a farmer and owned the farm where Lloyd Smith, at Centre Hill, now lives. The church referred to was razed in 1900 by D. A. Boozer. In doing so, the framework collapsed, injuring Morris Burkholder, Fred Christine and Aaron Thomas.

The Methodist congregation at Spruce town was organized about 1830, and in 1840 the first church was built. Meetings prior to this were held in an old house on the Sankey farm. The present Methodist church, at Spruce town was built in 1872. The present Methodist church in Centre Hall was erected in 1875, at a cost of \$3,500.—L. H., page 405.

Moses Felemslee had a distillery at the foot of the mountain at Centre Hall early in the 19th century. When the turnpike opened in 1823, he opened a tavern.

The Evangelical church at Centre Hall was formed about 1855. Rev. B. Hengst, pastor. Worship was first held in dwelling houses and later in the old school house. The first church was built in 1873.—L. H., page 408.

Note.—The first church, a two-story structure, was dismantled and rebuilt.

NEW PENNA. LAW KEEPS PROPERTIES OFF AUCT. BLOCK

A new Pennsylvania law provides legal channels to save the homes and farms of hundreds whose inability to pay threatened them with the loss of these real estate holdings on the auction block.

By signing the bill of Rep. John C. Hermansen, Luzerne, Gov. Clifford Pinchot gave the authority to stay writs of execution and tax sales of homes and farms. The courts have discretion in postponing the tax sales and many act only on application of an owner, lien holder, or other person in interest.

ROBERT J. MILLER NEW POSTMASTER AT STATE COLLEGE

The following is reprinted from the State College Times, May 19th:

Robert J. Miller, well-known local druggist, received word from Washington late Wednesday of his appointment acting postmaster following the will succeed Guy Z. Stover, who was named acting postmaster following the

resignation of George Glenn. Mr. Miller's permanent appointment awaits the confirmation of the Senate.

He resigned yesterday as a member of the borough council to which he was elected in 1931. Council has thirty days in which to name someone to fill his place. If it does not the Court will appoint the new member.

Mr. Miller was the Democratic candidate for the legislature at the general election last fall and is recognized as one of the outstanding members of that party in Centre county. He came to State College in 1920 and has conducted his drug business on Allen St. for the entire thirteen years of his residence here. He is a native of Philadelphia.

Thirteen has always been an important number for Mr. Miller. He graduated from High school in 1913, enlisted in the army on Friday, the 13th, made the voyage to France in thirteen days, was in France thirteen months, discharged on Friday, the 13th, was married in Friday, the 13th, and was appointed on the thirteenth of this month, although his notification did not arrive here until Wednesday.
