Potter township was erected in 1774 and embraced all of Penna Valley and therefore its early history is inseparably connected with the early history of Centre county. Centre Hall is located on a survey known as the Janet Sharron and was made in June 1774, and patented to William Macfar and remained in his family name until Mr. Lyon sold to Christian Hofer.
