WIELAND CLAN HOLD THEIR SECOND ANNUAL REUNION

On July 4th, on the Grange picnic grounds, there met approximately one hundred of the descendants of that name; kinship and friendship were beautifully keyed and all enjoyed the occasion which had to do with the Wieland family in America, founded by Michael Wieland in 1737, himself coming from near Stuttgart, in Wurtemberg, Germany.

The officers in charge supplied an interesting program. Chief speaker was Dr. W. C. Bortol, of Lewisburg, for 50 years on the Bucknell faculty, now retired.

Lewis Thesis, L. L. D. of Bucknell, gave an address of unusual interest, "The Great Runaway," which furnished the background to the pioneer life of the earliest Wieland family in Pennsylvania's early struggles - Indian combats, escapes and repossessing of lands, etc. - a most exhaustive address and brought much new material to those present.

A. P. Wieland, of State College, addressed his remarks especially to the present generation, and the cherished heritage that is ours; "keep this spirit alive and do honor to those who have gone on before. Give of your best in the community in which you live."

After the holding of a business meeting perfecting the organization, passing resolutions to meet next year in the park now a part of the pioneer Wieland farm at West Milton, and listening before departing for the various homes to a number of letters of regret from relatives in various parts of the United States, the day ended the once-a-year occasion happily.
