**DEATHS.**

**ROTHROCK**—Harry C. Rothrock, the well-known Centre county school man, passed away at his home in Bellefonte on Friday, at 3:00 o'clock P. M. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the home, and burial made in the Boalsburg cemetery.

Professor Rothrock was born February 8, 1861, near Bellefonte. He attended the public schools, later Bellefonte Academy, and Penn State College, graduating from the latter institution in 1885. He followed the profession of teaching until being appointed assistant superintendent of schools in Centre county, in which position he served eight years, retiring three years ago.

He was principal of the Centre Hall school for a number of years, and is most favorably recalled by pupils under his guidance and instruction. He also taught school in Boalsburg, where his work was equally successful. Port Matilda and probably other points in the county now refer to him as an outstanding instructor in their high schools.

He is survived by a wife, who before marriage was Miss Ella Fredericks, Boalsburg, and five children—namely, Miss Alda M.; Bloomsburg; Marjorie, wife of H. V. Coxey, Altoona; Rachel, wife of W. P. Moorhead, Indiana, Pa.; Lewis, New Bloomfield; and Harry D. at home; also, four grandchildren. Mrs. Martha Moran, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Kate R. Marshall, of Oklahoma City, Okla.; Col. W. P. Rothrock, State College; David Eber Rothrock, DuBois; John Franklin Rothrock, Bellefonte, are surviving sisters and brothers of the deceased.

His fraternal connections were with the Masonic lodge, Tyrone; Jaffa Temple, Altoona; Modern Woodmen, Millheim; Knights of Malta, Boalsburg; and his religious connection was with the Presbyterian denomination, wherever located. Mr. Rothrock and family became interested in local affairs—social, fraternal, religious and financial—and consequently were regarded a valuable asset to the community.

**HORNER**—Mrs. Amanda Horner, wife of George L. Horner, died at Pleasant Gap on Sunday, aged 75 years. She was born in Juniata county, a daughter of Joseph and Rebecca Marke. Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon, with burial at Pleasant Gap.

**Historical Facts**

The first Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, instituted in Pennsylvania, was Eagle Grange, No. 1, near Montgomery—Williamsport Sun.

In 1788, Gen. Potter built the first log house, long used as a tavern, at Potters Mills. The site is in a field to the front of the McCoy property. The mill and saw-mill were erected in 1788.

Gen. Potter died in 1789. The property passed to his son, who later became Judge James Potter. Before his death in 1819, Judge Potter erected the Allison and McCoy properties. He opened the first store in Potters Mills in 1790, and in 1813 he built the stone grist mill, later owned by Wm. Thompson, and destroyed by fire about 1880.—L. H. 411.

Tusseyville so called from its close proximity to Tussey Mountain, was formerly known as Churchville, but upon the location of a post office there it was found that the name conflicted with another village by the same name. Consequently to facilitate matters, it was changed to Tusseyville.—L. H. 412.

William Wolf was born near Rebersburg, April 30, 1824. He became the second merchant in Centre Hall, following his father-in-law, Henry Wittmer in the general mercantile business.—L. H. 413.

Hon. Frederick Kurtz was born at York in 1833. He established the Centre Reporter in Centre Hall, on the first day of April, 1868, and continued its editor until July, 1906.—L. H. 413.

Progress Grange No. 96, was organized Feb. 12, 1873. Fairview Grange No. 296, was organized July 4, 1874, in the Egg Hill school house.

Old Fort Lodge, No. 537, F. and A. M., was organized June 2, 1875. Centre Hall Lodge, No. 895, I. O. O. F., was organized Jan. 15, 1875.—L. H. page 410.

Ericsburg was laid out by William Earley, Esq., in 1795 or 1796, and was called at various times Williamsburg and Earleytown. A noted hotel-keeper was Walter Longwell, who came from Maryland, and was a landlord there in 1818.—L. H. 411.
