

zed Feb. 12, 1873. Fairview Grang No. 296, was organized July 4, 1874 in the Egg Hill school house. Old Fort Lodge, No. 537, F. and A M., was organized June 2, 1875.

Centre Hall Lodge, No. 895, I. O. C F., was organized Jan. 15, 1875 .-- L. H page 410.

Erleysburg was laid out by William Earley, Esq., in 1795 or 1796, and was called at various times Williamsburg and Earleytown. A noted hotel-keep er was Walter Longwell, who came from Maryland, and was a landlor there in 1818 .-- L. H. 411.
