FOUR BROTHERS ARRESTED FOR ROBBING FARMER'S 'BANK'

Four brothers, under arrest as a result of the theft Monday a week of \$20,000 in bonds and currency from the home of Isaac Menge, 62-year-old farmer, of Meiserville, Snyder county, were scheduled for hearings before H. E. Walter, Middleburg justice of the peace.

The brothers and the charges against them are George 16, and Ira, 23, forcible entry and larceny; Cloyd, 32, accessory before the fact, and Howard, 26, accessory after the fact. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mengle, of Augustaville, two miles east of Sunbury. According to police, the only relationship is that resulting from the marriage of the victim's daughter to Cloyd Mengle.

All of the loot has been recovered and each of the accused men has confessed, police say. The money and securities were taken from a trunk in the bedroom. Ill feeling between the victim and his son-in-law prompted police to pick up members of the Augustaville family late on the day of the robbery.

George confessed Saturday night, police said. He told police that he and Ira had obtained the loot by means of plans drawn by Cloyd. He is said to have told them what disposition had been made of the loot.

Sheriff Carl E. Runkle, who directed the investigation, said \$750 in cash and \$15,000 worth of negotiable securities were found under a pile of rocks in a clump of woods on a farm adjoining the victim's farm, and \$1635 was found in a jar in an orchard at the home of the father of the accused men.

Howard Mengle went to the Snyder county jail early Monday and turned over to authorities \$1335 which he said he found under a mattress at his home. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mengle are the parents of fourteen children.

Drawn for Jury Service.

VISCOSE PLANT, LEWISTOWN, 870 ADDITIONAL WORKERS

Approximately 899 additional men were put to work at the Lewistown plant of the Viscose Company, bringing the total number employed there up to 4500. The announcement that the men would be added was made Saturday afternoon by W. W. Stainton, plant superintendent, following his return from New York City, where superintendents of the company heard the new rayon code.

In addition to the hiring of 800 men and the 270 girls during the last two weeks, announcement was made that the wages of the employees would be boosted 20 per cent. all along the line.
