ADAMS COUNTY ASSESSORS TOLD TO REDUCE FIGURES

The assessors of Adams county received instructions from the commissioners for making the triennial assessment this fall. For some years the assessors of that county have been assessing property owners 60 per cent. of full value of the property and they were told that because of the depression they were to consider the present 60 per cent. as full value. They were also told that they were to reduce the valuation of farms and properties along improved roads 10 per cent. and on properties along unimproved or dirt roads the valuation was to be reduced 20 per cent.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

GROW RASPBERRY PLANTS—Farmers who have raspberry patches that are free from disease may grow their own plants for renewal. Shoots grown long and bent over can be used to propagate the new plants. Tips touching the ground can be covered with soil and induced to take root. Next spring these plants can be cut loose from the parent cane about 3 to 10 inches from the ground.

DRAINAGE PROVES WORTH—Thirteen years of extension demonstrations on drainage in Pennsylvania have proved the value of this practice. Use of 4-inch tile as a minimum for laterals, mains of proper size, and connections made through Y-branches form an enduring system when the outlets are kept open.

KILL RED MITES—Old engine oil or coal oil can be sprayed or painted on the perches and perch supports to exterminate red mites. This material should be applied the first thing in the morning so that it will soak into the wood before the birds go to roost. This treatment should be repeated several times during the summer.

BEEES NEED SPACE—Where there is prospect of a good buckwheat honey flow, beekeepers should watch their colonies and give them plenty of space for storing the crop. Under favorable conditions it is possible for a strong colony to gather as much as 15 pounds of nectar in one day. At this rate only a few days are required to fill a super.

TRAIN THE SHOW COLT—In training a colt for the show ring teaching him early to lead and stand is important. A colt which stands, walks and trots readily has a big advantage over the competitor which sulks and fights.

AUTO DRIVER AT LEWISTOWN FAIR INJURED IN CRASH

While qualifying for a five-mile heat at the Lewistown fair, on Saturday, afternoon, Al Smith, 28, Pottstown automobile racing driver, was injured, and as a result is in the F. W. Black hospital suffering from a fractured right arm above the elbow, contusions of the head, and undetermined other injuries. He crashed through a fence after rolling over.

Tom Hinnershitz, of Laurelton, who was following Smith, drove his car in front of the inside fence to avoid hitting the rolling car and the prostrate form. Hinnershitz escaped injury.
