Of Annual Corporate Meeting of CENTRE COUNTY HOSPITAL.

Notice is hereby given that the annual corporate meeting of the members of Centre County Hospital will be held at the Centre County Hospital in Bellefonte, Pa., on Monday, October 9th, 1933, at eight o'clock in the evening of said day, for the purpose of electing five Trustees, each for the term of three years, to succeed Trustees whose terms will then expire, representing Districts as hereinafter indicated, and to transact such other business as shall properly come before the said meeting.

District No. III, consisting of Centre Hall Borough, and Potter and Gregg Townships; District No. IV, consisting of Millheim Borough and Haines, Miles and Penn Townships; District No. V, consisting of Unionville Borough, and Union, Huston, Worth and Taylor Townships; District No. VI, consisting of Howard Borough, Milesburg Borough, and Boggs, Curtin, Howard and Liberty Townships; and District No. VII, consisting of Snow Shoe and Snow Shoe and Burnside Townships; are each entitled to elect one of said Trustees, aggregating said five Trustees.

Henry Rishel, in 1812, settled near Penn Hall, and in 1832 purchased a home at Farmers Mills and made it permanent. His wife was Maria Dorthier, who bore him one son, John. John was a justice of the peace and as such had the faculty of adjusting differences, sending few, if any, cases to court.

Note.—A second wife, Catharine Howan, was the mother of Martin L. Rishel, who like the father, was a well-known Gregg township justice. William F. Rishel now lives on the Rishel homestead as owner. Another son is John H. Rishel, Centre Hall; Mrs. Wm. Bradford, Phoenixville; Mrs. W. H. Sinkabine, Berryville, Va., and Mrs. Harry R. Brungart, Pittsburgh, are daughters.

Dr. Grossman was probably the first resident physician in Gregg township. He was succeeded by Dr. McCoy, after him Dr. Charles Smith, and then Dr. R. P. Van Valzah, and later by Dr. F. H. Van Valzah.—L. H. 291.

Way back when the boys used to go to the churches Sunday nights to pick up girls, and were too modest to step up boldly and make the request to see them home (mind you, home!) they would present a card, on which was printed the picture of a proud rooster and a dejected donkey, with drooping ears. And now, September 19th, 1933, it appearing that by reason of existing and self evident future changes in the statute law relating to beer and intoxicating liquors, as well as by reason of the location of competent detachments of the Pennsylvania State Police, and the State Highway Patrol within the County of Centre, the necessity no longer exists for the employment of a special detective to assist the District Attorney in obtaining evidence for the Commonwealth in criminal cases, it is hereby ordered, adjudged and decreed that, effective January 1st, 1934, the former decree of this Court, dated June 20th, 1928, then made upon the petition of the District Attorney, pursuant to Section 1 of the Act of May 19, 1874, P. L. 218, shall be, and is hereby, vacated, set aside and annulled.
