

# Voters Give Johnston Plurality of 1313. Prohibition Is Voted Out of the Constitution.

Philip H. Johnston, Democrat, carried Centre county by 1313 plurality over his Republican opponent, Musser W. Gettig, for the office of District Attorney, at Tuesday's election.

The vote was: JOHNSTON, 7550; GETTIG, 6237.
