HUNTER KILLED NEAR GREENBURG, SUGAR VALLEY

Clinton county had its second fatal hunting accident this season, Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, when a gun in the hands of George Moyer was accidentally discharged while he was rabbit hunting near Greenburg, Clinton county, and the shot fatally wounded his brother-in-law, Lawrence Baker, 35, of near Lewisburg, causing his death half an hour later. Coroner W. J. Shoemaker, of Lock Haven, conducted an investigation and will hold an inquest later in the week. Baker is survived by his widow.

\$61,750 FOR POST OFFICE IN CENTRE COUNTY TOWN

Phillipsburg is one of the Centre county towns to share in the Public Works Grant by the National Government. Phillipsburg will participate in the \$16,678,675 fund to the amount of \$61,750, which sum will be used for the erection of a post office building.

Pennsylvania's share of the fund is \$1,870,515, and will be distributed to twenty-six communities.

The measure being put into operation is almost identical to that so strongly advocated by Speaker John Garner and opposed most vigorously by President Hoover. Hoover won then, but now practically the same measure is being carried out.

CHILD DIES FROM BURNS.

Mildred Billett, four years old, during a brief absence of her mother from the home at Coleville, is believed to have lighted a piece of paper and set her clothing on fire, resulting in extensive burns and the child's death in the Centre county hospital a few hours later. The child was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Billett.

F. D. R. TO PROCLAIM DRY LAWS END; DEATH 4 TAXES

President Roosevelt will soon issue a formal proclamation of the repeal of the 18th Amendment, as well as the end of four taxes, and their effective dates, as follows:

1. Half a cent of the gasoline tax, to be dropped January 1.
2. The 5 per cent tax on dividends at the source, dropped January 1.
3. The capital stock tax, dropped next July 1.
4. The excess profits tax, to be dropped at the end of the taxable year, as selected by the taxpayer.

The Treasury estimates these taxes produce \$227,000,000 a year.

RECEIVER IS NAMED FOR NEW BERLIN BANK

The First National Bank of New Berlin has been taken from the hands of a conservator and placed in the hands of a receiver, Ernest Watson, of Millersburg, Friday relieved A. A. Shiffer, of New Berlin, on instructions from Washington.

Mr. Shiffer was cashier of the bank at the time of the holiday called in March and was named conservator of that institution when it failed to open its doors after the holiday was lifted. The First National has been and still is regarded as a sound firm and no explanation is given for the action taken. The closing of the bank ties up the funds of a formerly prosperous agricultural community.

Shot Fox Squirrel 23 Inches in Length.

Russell W. Bohn, teacher in the local grammar school, on Tuesday morning shot a fox squirrel which measured 23 inches from tip of nose to tip of tail. The squirrel was not unusually heavy in body, but its body length was greater than that of the average grey squirrel.

Mifflin County Has Fatal Hunting Accident

Mifflin county's first fatal hunting accident occurred Friday afternoon when Jay Reese, 17, of Juniata Terrace, was killed less than a mile from his home fifteen minutes after he started out for small game.

The boy was shot in the right side of the head near the ear and died instantly. He was hunting with Dennis Reese, 17, his cousin, and Duane Cloney, 32, his brother-in-law, both of Juniata Terrace.

Members of the victim's family said the three had started from their homes about 2:15 o'clock and had gone to a field. The victim's shotgun was loaded and another shotgun was found within five feet of the body with an exploded shell in the breach.

The victim is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Reese, and the following brothers and sisters: Russell, Clark, Robert, Donald, Gerald, Paul, Della and Helen.

RESULT OF THE ELECTION IN NEARBY COUNTIES

In Union county, former sheriff John Hackenberg was elected sheriff on the Republican ticket over Donald Cook, Democrat, by 441 plurality.

Blair county Republicans elected their candidate, George Wolf, for sheriff, over Mr. Summers, D; John Elliott, R, over Mr. Shute, D, for prothonotary. Tyrone defeated the movement of its borough council to take over the light plant owned by the Penn Central Company.

Mifflin county Democrats elected their candidate, Charles C. Duck, by a plurality of more than 1200 over the Republican candidates Perry L. Powell and Charles H. Garrett.

Huntingdon county Democrats put up a stiff fight for the election of their candidate for sheriff, Steele, Republican, leading by but 448 votes.

South Renovo, the only district in Clinton county to vote on the question of retail liquor, voted 141 for and 55 against. The most important county office filled at the election was that of jury commissioner, and, of course, there was no opposition. Eugene H. Baird, of Ridgway, was re-elected judge in the judicial district, also without opposition.

SHEFFIELD MILK PRICES.

The net cash price to be paid the members of the Sheffield Cooperative Association, Inc., for grade B milk testing 3.5% in the 201-210 mile zone is \$1.75 per hundred pounds for the month of October, subject to the established freight, grade and butterfat differentials. This is 46 cents a hundred pounds more than the price for October, 1932.

Nothing can prevent lower milk prices except smaller production or greater demand. There is altogether too much milk to meet market requirements. Cheese made at this time of the year is not readily salable and the market for butter is greatly overstocked.

OFFICIAL COUNT SHOWS CARSON RE-ELECTED J. OF P.

Error in Tabulation in South Precinct of Potter Would Have Given G. W. Sharer Majority of 8 Votes.

An official count made at the commissioners' office of the vote for justice of the peace in Potter township, revealed an error in tabulation in the south precinct of Potter, changing the original count of 73 for George W. Sharer to 60. On the face of unofficial returns as given out last week, Geo. W. Sharer was elected to the office by a majority of 8 votes. The discovery of the error changes the majority in favor of Frank A. Carson to four votes. The total of the three precincts is, Carson, 185; Sharer, 181.

This permission is granted with the understanding that complete data on which the consolidated inventory and return is based shall be maintained at the principal office of the company, and a copy of the individual inventory of each separate store is retained on the premises.—Toner A.
