Prepared to Save Lives

One of the most valuable services given to the American public by the Red Cross is through its Life Saving and First Aid courses. Virtually all of the life guards at beaches and pools in the nation are Red Cross life savers. Nearly every industry in America supports the First Aid work of the Red Cross because it annually saves lives of thousands of injured persons. These courses are taught by Red Cross experts in both lines. Last year 66,354 certificates were issued to persons completing the First Aid course and 78,795 certificates for completing Life Saving instruction.

War Veterans' Problems

Not since the period of the World War has the Red Cross faced a greater problem in handling the claims of World War and other veterans. Due to the changes in the regulations covering veterans' claims, chapters all over the nation have been crowded with veteran applicants for relief and for service in preparing appeals. During last year Red Cross home service workers in 3,268 chapters dealt with the problems of 411,124 ex-service men or their families. The chapters also aided 7,246 men still in the regular army, navy and marine corps.

Historical Facts

[Under this head will appear one or more historical facts of local interest, to a large extent taken from Linn's History of Centre and Clinton counties, designated for reference as L. H. the figures following indicating page. The "Notes," if any, are those of the editor. The history was written in 1883.]

[Continued from last week.]

An inquest over the body of David Lewis was held July 13, 1820, before William Petriken, Esq., and the following jurors: Andrew Gregg, Thomas Burnside, John Blanchard, Joseph Miles, James Dundass, Henry Vandye, Patrick Cambridge, John Rankin, James Rothrock, Evan Miles, Thomas Hastings, Jr., Richard Miles Jr., William Alexander, and John Irwin, Jr., who found that James McGhee, coroner of the county, with his posse, had gone in pursuance of the Governor's proclamation, as well as of a recent felony by said Lewis and others on the property of Hammond and Page.

Felix McGuire, the other robber, was tried August 29th, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary at Philadelphia after the expiration of his term in the Franklin county jail, out of which he had broken, and he was ordered to be delivered to the sheriff of Franklin county.

Governor Findlay, during his term, pardoned Lewis, who had been convicted of some offense, and the confession of David Lewis, edited, it is said, by James Duncan, of Carlisle, was printed as a campaign document, and contributed largely to Governor Findlay's defeat.

Duncan was appointed auditor-general April 2, 1831, by Gov. Heister. The confession states that Lewis was born March 4, 1790, at Carlisle, -L. H. p. 62.

(Note. -Wm. Findlay, a Democrat, was elected governor of Pennsylvania by a majority of 7,059 over Joseph Heister, Federalist, and served from 1817 to 1820. In the next campaign, Heister defeated Findlay by a majority of but 1,605. In the first election there were but eleven and in the second but twenty-one scattering votes in the whole State.)

AMISH PATRIARCH IS BURIED.

Borne on a spring wagon, followed by nine hundred black buggies filled with mourners, the body of Bishop Daniej J. Beachy, 86, patriarch of the Amish colony at Arthur, Ill., was carried to a corn field cemetery recently. He fell dead on Saturday.

The colony was founded after the Civil war when the Bishop of that time, Joseph Amish, said that his people in Pennsylvania had become "worldly" and pleaded with them to enter a new land. Today the colony has a population of about 4,000 families.
