LAMB CLUB MEETING.

Boys and Girls of Centre County, During Past 7 Years, Have Sold Lambs for \$25,123.03.
The Centre County Lamb Feeding club met in the Court House, Bellefonte, on Monday evening. The officers of the club were elected as follows: Richard Ross, Centre Hall, president; Alice Foust, Centre Hall, vice-president; Margaret Ross, Centre Hall, secretary-treas; in addition to the officers Charles Harter, Jacksonville, was elected a club leader for the year. He has completed seven years of lamb club work.
The club decided to hold the local roundup on Saturday, January 6, because of limited space in the Farm Show building, the Centre County group can only exhibit eight pens out of ten.
At the meetings club members decided to ship their lambs to Harrisburg by truck on January 13. The members themselves will go down on Wednesday January 17, and return January 19.
While attending the show they will be a part of the State 4H Club Camp. In addition to exhibiting lambs and attending camp, the members will compete in the State corn and potato judging contests. The Centre County team last year won fourth place in the corn judging contest. They hope to place nearer the top in both contests this year.
The lambs will be judged on Thursday of Farm Show week and sold at auction on Friday.
During the past seven years of lamb club work boys and girls of Centre county have fed 251 lambs. These lambs sold for \$25123.03 and returned to their owners \$484.00.

November 19, 1903--
