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FARM CALENDAR. Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

BROILER MARKET VARIES—Prices for broilers have followed a decided seasonal trend in recent years. From January to early March they have increased. Then there has been a gradual decrease until June or July when fairly uniform prices prevailed.

PLAN GOOD GARDEN—Plan the over garden judiciously this year. Select plant materials which are hardy in the section where you live. Purchase from reliable sources. A good plant is worth a dozen questionable bargains.

WORK THE BROOD MARES—Idleness, the bane of horse breeding, should be avoided. Working mares are more certain of producing good foals than idle ones, but judgment must be used in working them. Too heavy pulling, over-exertion and backing heavy loads must be avoided.

GOOD SEED YIELDS MORE—An average increase of 51.7 bushels an acre in favor of disease-free seed potatoes over local seed has been obtained in 13,078 comparative demonstrations conducted by extension workers in Pennsylvania.

PREPARE SOIL PROPERLY—A good soil mixture for growing early vegetables in hotbeds and flats is essential. This soil mixture should contain from one-third to one-half organic matter. Such a soil will be friable, will not bake at the surface, will hold moisture well, and will produce a good root system.

HAVE EFFICIENT BIRDS—The poultry flock must be made up of birds which produce many eggs each, especially during the season of highest prices. The eggs must be of good size and of a quality which will bring the highest market prices. Birds of low average mortality will contribute to high efficiency of the flock throughout the year.

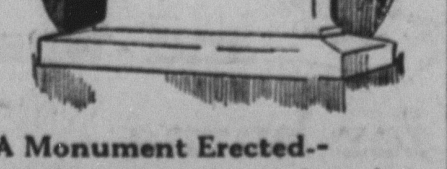
