Deaths

HOSTERMAN.—Frederick O. Hosterman, for many years one of Millheim's most prominent citizens and business men, died Monday morning after a few hours' illness, from uremic poisoning which affected his heart. There were slight indications on Sunday night, on retiring, that he was not at his best. Death took place at the well appointed home of the deceased which he built in 1895, located near the Lutheran church.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) forenoon from the home, Rev. V. Lasher, of the Lutheran church, his pastor, to officiate. He was long prominently connected with that church, and supported liberally in a financial way.

Mr. Hosterman was the youngest in the family of Jacob and Anna Bower Hosterman, an early settler in Haines township, in the vicinity of Fiedler. He was born at Fiedler, March 5, 1859, making his age 74 years, 11 months. He began his career as a farm hand at \$2.00 per month at the age of thirteen, but continued in that line of work only a short time. Fiedler & Runkle conducted a general store at Fiedler, and it was there the young man during a three and one-half years clerkship got his first business experience. He then bought out his employers giving a note for the transaction and used his available cash to purchase goods. He built up a fine trade and in 1893 disposed of his holdings and located in Millheim. A year later he purchased the Smith-Musser hardware store, at which time, Oct. 1, 1894, the partnership of Hosterman-(L. E.) Stover Co., hardware merchants, was formed, which business is being carried on under the same firm name today, although Mr. Hosterman became dissociated from the firm seven years ago.

He was twice married, the first wife having been Susan Stover. The couple had one daughter, whose death occurred in infancy. The second wife was Lizzie Winegardner, who with two sons survive him. Russell, the oldest son, is an instructor in aviation at the Bellefonte Academy, and the younger son, Frederick O., is a student in that institution.

CAMPBELL.—James D. Campbell, a guard at Rockview Penitentiary, died in the Clearfield hospital on Friday, following a gall stone operation Monday previous. Funeral services were held at the home on Lamb street, Bellefonte, Monday afternoon, with burial at Shiloh church, services by Chaplain Laurer and Rev. W. J. Wagner.

EATON.—Mrs. George Eaton, a former resident of Orangeville, Pa., died at her home in Freeport, Sunday evening. She was seized with a heart attack. The funeral was held Wednesday, with burial at Freeport.

Anna Gertrude Sample was born at Pine Grove Mills, July 18, 1869. She was united in marriage to George W. Eaton, Feb. 22, 1877. They moved to Freeport about 23 years ago. Besides her husband Mrs. Eaton is survived by the following children, Fred, Maude, and Helen Eaton at home; Miss Mary Eaton, New York City; Miss Mary Eaton, Chicago. There are also two sisters, Mrs. J. M. Musser, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. J. A. Boyer, of Somerset, Pa.

BOYER.—Daniel Boyer, aged 81, for many years a farmer in Centre county, died at the Lock Haven hospital Wednesday, of last week. He had been a patient since January 16, suffering from gangrene. His physical condition prohibited the amputation of his foot where the infection had developed.

Mr. Boyer was born in Hubersburg, and resided there all his life with the exception of several years when he lived near Yarnell. He was a member of the United Brethren church. Surviving are three daughters and one son: Mrs. Charles Brown, of Yarnell; Mrs. E. Floyd Breth and Brinsley Boyer, of Avis and Mrs. Clay Shope, of Geneva, N. Y.; one brother and one half-brother, John Boyer, of Dunbar, Fayette county, and J. A. Boyer, of Bellefonte. Funeral services were held in the Advent church, near Milesburg Saturday morning, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Miller, and interment made in the cemetery at the church.

MUSSER.—Mrs. Susan Tibbens Musser widow of Michael Musser, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Archie Eungard, in the Penna. Cave district, on Thursday. She was born near where she died, July 26, 1856, and was therefore aged 77 years, 7 months and 5 days. She was a daughter of Michael and Mary Ann Zeigler. Funeral services were held Tuesday forenoon with burial in the Union cemetery, Farmers Mills, Rev. Miller, of the Reformed church officiating.

There survive the deceased these children: Miss Esta, Clarence, Mrs. Archie Eungard, and Harry. Mrs. Musser and a daughter, Miss Esta, lived in Madisonburg but when winter came they went to the farm home of Mrs. Eungard to live, and at this place the death occurred.

UNDERWOOD.—Wm. Irwin Underwood, of Philadelphia, a native of Centre county, died at the Underwood Sanatorium, at Woodbury, N. J., following an illness of heart trouble. He was a son of Jesse and Susan Irwin Underwood, and was born at Unionville 74 years ago. Prior to his death he had been engaged in the lumber business. He was a member of the Society of Friends and the Centre County Association in Philadelphia. Isaac Underwood, of Bellefonte, is a brother of the deceased. Burial was made at Mickleton, N. J.
