Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the Garman residence, in charge of the Rev. David Nelson, of the Blanchard church. Burial was in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

MUSICK.—Daisy Musick, wife of Daniel Musick, died at the family home at Spring Mills, R. D., following complications. She was the daughter of Jacob and Harriet (Shreckegast) Auman and was born in Penn township; she was aged 60 years, 7 months and 11 days.

She was married August 20, 1891, to Daniel Musick, who survives with the following children: Elmer, of Aaronsburg; Jacob, of Woodward; Mrs. Geo. Riland and Clarence, of Mifflinburg; Harry, of Spring Mills; Mrs. Walter Spickler, of Allentown; and Ernest, at home. Also surviving are the following brothers and sisters: Daniel Auman, of Millheim; Mrs. Michael Wance and Mude Auman, both of Spring Mills.

Mrs. Musick was a member of the Paradise Evangelical church and her pastor, Rev. Paul M. Miller, of Rebersburg, officiated at services held in the Paradise church, with interment being made in the cemetery adjoining the church.

CASSLER.—Mrs. Victoria Cassler, nee Stambach, widow of A. E. Cassler, died at the home of a daughter in Holsopple, Somerset county, on the 11th inst. Death was due to a severe attack of grippe. Mrs. Cassler was a former resident of Aaronsburg, having been a daughter of Rev. Elias Stambach, a former Evangelical minister on the Penns Valley circuit. She had been living in the vicinity of Holsopple for fifty years. Surviving her are four children—Anna, of Conneville; Georgia, at home; Mrs. Martha Jones, and James, all of Holsopple; also, two brothers, Charles, of York, and Albert, of Lock Haven.

Seven ministers attended the funeral, three of whom were nephews of the deceased. The six pallbearers were also nephews.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

SELECT GOOD BERRIES—Reliable strawberry varieties for Pennsylvania are Howard 17 or Premier, Aberdeen, William Belt, and Big Joe. Fruit extension specialists of State College also consider Fairfax and Dorsett worthy of trial.

USE COBS AS LITTER—Ground corn cobs make a satisfactory litter for chicks. This material is cheap, dry, and light in weight. The cobs should be ground fine enough so the pieces will pass through a one-half inch mesh wire screen.

GET SPRAY MATERIALS EARLY—Potato growers who get their spray materials early are ready to apply the first spray as soon as the majority of the plants are through the surface of the ground. It is a good plan to order a surplus of material so that there will be plenty to take care of the season's spraying. Any lime or bluestone left over will keep well if properly stored.

PUT HORSES IN CONDITION—Horses expected to do hard work later this spring should be prepared through exercise, good care and proper feed. A horse engaged in heavy work needs about twice as much protein as the same horse doing light work.

SAVE VEGETABLE PLANTS—Seed and soil treatments to kill the fungi which cause the death of vegetable seedlings and weaken others will increase the stands of young plants. In some instances growers who treat get from three to six times as many plants from the same amount of seed as when planted without treatment.

PROTECT BABY CHICKS—Placing all feed and water containers for chicks on low platforms covered with hardware cloth will prevent the chicks from picking up contaminated feed and water.
