LEWISTOWN INSURANCE AGENT A SUICIDE, MONDAY MORNING

Less than two hours after he was found in the kitchen of his home with a bullet wound in his head, Tempest M. Bulew, 50, insurance agent, widely known in Millifin county, died in the Lewistown hospital Monday morning. Bulew was found mortally wounded by his wife, who heard the shot at 7:30 o'clock and came down from the bedroom to investigate. Her husband was lying on the floor of the kitchen, a .22-calibre automatic pistol at his side. Relatives of Bulew say they know of no reason why he should commit suicide.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons, Lester and Charles Bulew, and two daughters, Mrs. Sara C. Shurt and Mrs. Edna Denlinger, all of Lewistown.

LYTLER—Funeral services for James Irvin Lytle, 88, who died in Bellwood Friday morning, were held Monday afternoon in the Presbyterian church in State College. Interment followed in the Branch cemetery.

Mr. Lytle, one of Centre county's oldest residents, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Gilbert Watts, with whom he had been living since last November. He had been ill of pneumonia for only a few days.

Born at Lemont on November 12, 1845, Mr. Lytle moved to State College in 1907 from his farm at Earlytown, south of Centre Hall. He served with the Union armies during the Civil War, in Co. G, 148th Infantry, P. V. I., and taught for many years at the Branch school. He was the son of Griffith Lytle and Susan Foster Lytle. During his residence at State College he built a number of properties. Surviving are three children, Irwin Ross, of Ingleswood, Calif.; Preston Kay, of State College, and his sister in Bellwood with whom he had resided since the death of his wife, Mrs. Laura Ross Lytle.

KESSLER—Elmer Lewis Kessler died early Sunday morning from complications. He was a son of Edwin and Lucinda Kessler and was born at Blooming Grove, York county, March 7, 1866, making his age 68 years, 24 days at the time of death. Mrs. Reiber was a daughter of the late Jacob Runkle, and was born in Penna Valley, March 20, 1838. She leaves a number of relatives in Centre Hall and Potter township.

KENNELLY—Robert Gates Kennelly, born and reared at Spring Mills, and where he lived continuously all his life, died at his home there on Monday, shortly after the noon hour. He had been in delicate health during the past few years and since the death of his wife, Minnie Kennelly, in May of 1932, he lived alone during much of the time. He was a carpenter by trade.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon, with burial in the cemetery at the Georges Valley church, services to be conducted by Rev. S. F. Greenhoe. The deceased became a member of the Georges Valley Lutheran church during his youth, and later transferred his membership to the Spring Mills church.

He was the son of Stephen and Sarah Breen and was the youngest of thirteen children and the last survivor. His age was 70 years, 6 months and 22 days.
