LANDIS.—George W. Landis died suddenly from a heart attack at his home in Chicago, Illinois, on Thursday of last week. Funeral services were held on Saturday.

Mr. Landis was born and reared at Potters Mills, leaving that place before attaining his majority, about 1879, for the West, and later was employed as a conductor on the Atcheson & Topoka railroad, remaining with the company until he became interested as a part owner in an ice manufacturing plant, which engaged his attention at the time of his death.

The deceased was a son of George and Mary (Hess) Landis, and was born August, 1862, making his age almost seventy-two years. He was twice married, first to Minnie Fritz, of Bellewood, Illinois. To this union there was born a son, Albert Landis, Chicago. The second wife was Sarah Speer, of Chicago, who survives, as also does a son, William Landis, Chicago. Miss Sarah Landis, Potters Mills, and Mrs. John McClenahan, Trotters, North Dakota, are surviving sisters. William Bower and Mrs. Perry McKinney, late of Potter township, and Mrs. Mary Koch, late of Salem, Ohio, all deceased, were half-brothers and half-sisters of Mr. Landis.

DERSTINE.—The following is reprinted from the Freeport (Ill.) Standard-Journal of April 23rd: Jacob S. Derstine, 73, a resident of Freeport for the past 52 years, passed away at his home, 515 Iroquois street, at 8 o'clock Saturday night following an extended illness.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Wagner funeral home, South Chicago avenue, at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Rev. Carl M. Grabl, pastor of Zion, Reformed church, will conduct the services and interment will be made at Oakland. Friends may view the body at the Derstine home until 11 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The following will act as bearers: C. W. France, J. C. Vaughan, Preston A. Boyd, R. D. Ditzler, Clarence Schmidt, and Fred Mempel, all employees of the Henney Motor company. Excelsior lodge of Masons will have charge of services at the grave.

Mr. Derstine was born at Centre Hall, Pa., Jan. 3, 1861. He came west when young and settled in Freeport. He was united in marriage 48 years ago to Miss Clara Long, who passed away in January, 1923. He is survived by a brother, Rev. M. S. Derstine, of Ramey, Pa., and two sisters, Miss Rebecca Derstine, of Ramey, Pa., and Mrs. John H. Puff, Centre Hall.

Mr. Derstine followed the occupation of a carriage trimmer and was employed at the old John R. Robinson plant during the existence of that concern here. Later he was employed by the Haney Buggy company, then by the Stephenson Motor company, and finally by the Henney Motor company. Mr. Derstine was affiliated with Freeport Consistory and co-ordinate bodies.

SMILEY.—Mrs. Susan Smiley, widow of William Smiley, died at the home of C. M. Phillips, Porter township, Clinton county, aged 86 years, after several months' illness of complication of diseases.

She was a native of Farmers Mills but had lived in Nittany Valley for 17 years, and prior to that time had resided in Coalport many years where she was a member of the United Brethren church. Surviving her are two sisters, Mrs. John Ziegler, of Howard, and Mrs. Rose Winkelman, of Altoona.

Mr. Lytle enlisted in the Union army at the age of 17 and was assigned to Company H, 7th Pennsylvania Volunteers. He later re-enlisted in Companies G and C of the 49th Pennsylvania, being made a corporal in Company C.

He was the last of a family of eleven children, the old home place being located at the Branch. He was married to Mary Ellen Stover of Boalsburg, who died December 11, 1931.

She leaves three children: Mrs. Joseph J. Weaver, State College; Irvin Rishell, of Lemont, and Mary Rishell, of Wilmington, Delaware, and a brother and sister, Harry I. Williams, of Cleveland, Ohio, and Mrs. Sim Baum, of Bellefonte.

MUSSER.—Mary Jane Musser, widow of Wm. H. Musser, died on Monday from complications at her home in Millheim. She had been confined to bed since September, and to her room for a year. Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) forenoon with burial in Fairview cemetery, Rev. Leshar of the Lutheran church, pastor of the deceased, officiating.

Mrs. Musser was the eldest and the last survivor of the children of Peter

W. and Rebecca Long Ziegler, both deceased, and was born in Gregg township, April 21st, 1856, and became 78 years of age last month. She is survived by two children: George Musser, a garage man, Lewistown, and Mrs. Alma Haines, with whom she made her home. Miss Sarah Haines, a member of the Centre Hall High school faculty, is one of six grandchildren.

ALBRIGHT.—Carrie May Albright, a maiden lady, died early Monday morning in Millheim. She was a daughter of Charles W. and Mary Ann Albright, both deceased, and was born December 18, 1875, and was therefore aged 58 years, 4 months and 12 days. She is survived by two brothers, John T.
