BIERLY.—A life-long resident of Miles township, Charles Cornelius Bierly, passed away at his home in Rebersburg, Saturday morning.

He was a son of the late Reuben D. and Paulina Frank Bierly. He was married to Adah R. Weber, Jan. 28, 1897, who with one daughter, Dorothea, of State College, survives.

He was a consistent member of the Rebersburg Lutheran church, held various offices in it and was a member of the choir for forty years.

He was a mechanic by trade having served his apprenticeship under his father until his death in 1912, when he took over the business, adding to it tin-smithing and plumbing.

HALL.—George C. Hall, 86, for 18 years Archdeacon of Wilmington, died after an illness of several years.

Dr. Hall was educated at Mt. Dempsy Academy, Landisburg, Pa., and was graduated from Franklin and Marshall College in 1872.

Mr. Hall served churches in Great Bend, and later at Chambersburg and Danville. From 1886 to 1894 he was archdeacon at Scranton and rector at Grace church at Honesdale.

He was selected Bishop of Tokio, Japan, in 1884, by the House of Bishops, but the House of Deputies did not confirm his election, due to it was after reported, to a misconception of his age.

STINE.—The Rev. Robert Henderson Stine, retired minister of the Methodist church, died at his home in Williamsport, Thursday night, after a long illness.

He was born in Buffalo Run, Centre county, in 1849. He had spent 40 years in the Methodist ministry and had been retired for several years.

He is survived by two sons and two daughters. Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon; interment in Gray's cemetery, Centre county.

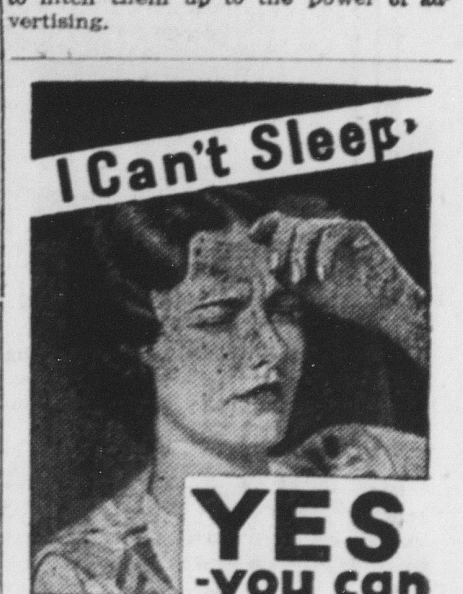
