LUTH. SYNOD ELECTS DELEGATES TO BI-ENNIAL CONVENTION IN SAVANNAH, THIS FALL

The Susquehanna Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America, comprising 162 congregations with a baptized membership of more than 53,000, and a total expenditure last year of approximately \$50,000, met in annual session in St. Matthews Lutheran church, Bloomsburg, May 15-17.

Dr. F. H. Knobel, president of the United Lutheran Church in America, addressed the members of the Brotherhood of the Synod Tuesday evening when more than 500 men were assembled. The Millheim parish with 41 men present had the largest delegation. Dr. Knobel emphasized the need of the application of the Christian principles of courage, purity of life, and love in the trying times through which we are passing.

Delegates elected to the bi-ennial convention of the United Lutheran Church to be held in Savannah, Ga., this fall include: Rev. W. M. Reardon, D. D., Millfieldburg; Rev. J. F. Harkins, State College; Rev. L. S. Spangler, Newport; Rev. D. C. Baer, Selinsgrove; Rev. H. F. Shoaf, Jersey Shore; Rev. H. O. Reynolds, Hartleton; Rev. J. H. Goss,

Lewistown; and Rev. N. S. Wolf, D. D., Bloomsburg. Lay delegates chosen are: Benjamin Apple, Sunbury; E. L. Holman, New Bloomfield; Carl Millward, Milton; Brady F. Beck, Lock Haven; Frank T. Boyer, Millburg; John W. Wilson, Sunbury; H. E. Witt, Lewistown; and S. J. Johnston, Bloomsburg.

Thomas B. Kline, Philadelphia; Ira Hoffman, Gettysburg; Warren J. Wolf, Sunbury, and J. Louis Wolf, Bloomsburg, were ordained to the gospel-ministry Thursday evening.
