The Gregg Township Vocational School received an additional \$500.00 from the Works Division of the State Industrial Relief for completing the athletic field connected with the school. The work on the field was begun last fall, but due to unfavorable weather conditions the estimate of cost was too low. Later an additional sum was granted, and finally the grant referred to above. The project calls for twenty-four men to work for six days. During that time the field can be brought close if not altogether to completion. The plan now provides for a parking place and a gravel walk from the school building to the field. The walk will be constructed, through an arrangement with the Allison estate, on hillsides on the north side of the road. This will eliminate danger to pedestrians from automobile traffic, which under conditions prevailing during the past year was a hazard.
