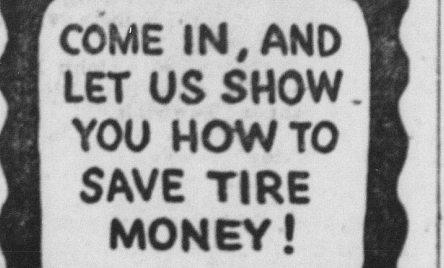
CENTRE HALL, 1; BELLEFONTE, 3. Centre Hall's standing in the league to date is four games won and seven lost.
