DR. WOODS DEAD.—After an illness of ten years from a complication of diseases, Dr. Woods died at his home on Sunday evening, at 9:40.

Dr. William Wilson Woods was a son of Dr. J. F. and Mary A. Woods, both deceased, and was born in Boalsburg 53 years ago. He was a graduate of the U. of P. and practiced his profession at Rexford, Pa., Wilmington, Del., and Boalsburg.

During the World War he was appointed Major in the Medical Reserve Corps and served at different camps as a heart and lung specialist. He was a member and loyal supporter of the Presbyterian church, also the Masonic and Shriners and the American Legion. An outstanding trait was his devotion to his aged mother who died more than a year ago.

Two brothers, Dr. Frank Woods and Dr. Samuel Woods, preceded him in death, and these sisters survive: Mrs. T. O. Glenn, Bradford; Mrs. Laura Place, Jamaica, N. Y.; Mrs. James Bryson, Watsonstown, and Mrs. Irvin Johnston, of Crafton.

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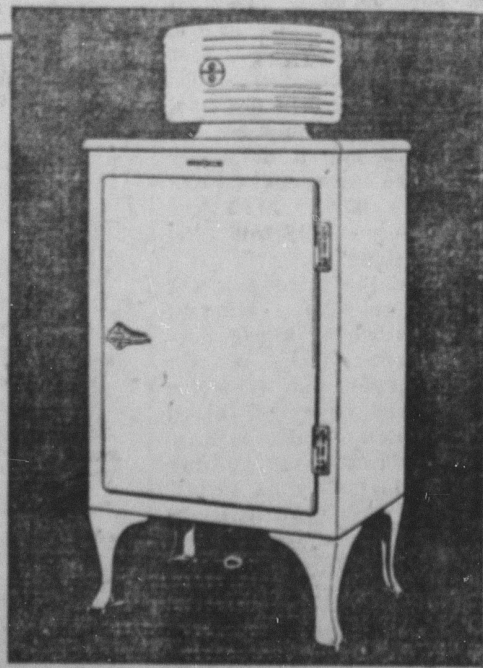
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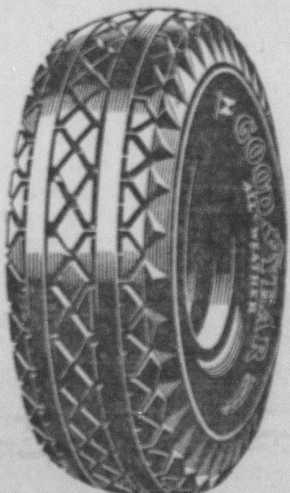


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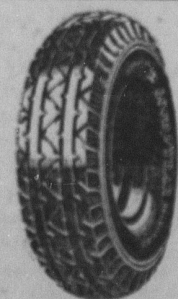
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
