**Deaths**

**HANEY**—Rev. Ezra Haney passed out of this life very unexpectedly, on Monday evening at his home at Salladasburg, Lycoming county, where he was pastor of an Evangelical church. He filled his appointments on Sunday, but Monday evening while seated at a table rested his head in his hands and complained of not feeling well. His housekeeper assisted him to a couch nearby, where he died in a short time thereafter.

Rev. Haney was a native of Bucks county and came to the Spring Mills Evangelical appointment in 1901 or 1902. Other appointments filled by him were Nanticoke, Trout Run, and last at Salladasburg.

Mrs. Haney died seven years ago, but he is survived by these children: Wm. H. Haney, a former resident of Centre Hall, now at Rising Sun, Md.; Charles Haney, Lock Haven; Joseph Haney, Hubersburg; and Victor Haney, Curwensville.

Funeral services will be held at Millheim, where burial will take place this (Thursday) afternoon.

**SWARTZ**—Mrs. Sadie Swartz, wife of Herbert Swartz, died at the Geisinger hospital, Danville, on Saturday. The body was brought to the Swartz home below Aronsburg, from where funeral services were held on Wednesday, with burial in the cemetery at Madisonburg. Rev. Griesing of the Reformed church was the pastor in charge.

Death was the result of pleurisy after an illness since February.

The deceased was a daughter of Adam and Sarah Zubler Hazel, both deceased, and was born near Madisonburg. She is survived by her husband and four children, namely, Marguerite, Frances, Paul and Randolph; also by these brothers and sisters: Albert, of Fleming; Mrs. James Kling, Oak Hall Station; Ammon J. Boalsburg; William, Bellevue, Ohio; Edward and Byron, of Youngstown, Ohio; and Norman of Aronsburg.

The deceased was aged fifty five years. She was a sister of the late Mrs. Cora Smith, deceased, wife of Postmaster R. M. Smith, Centre Hall.

Dolan was hit by a wild pitch, Harris and McCauley each singled, and Snyder hit a three-base sock, to give Lamar three more runs in the fourth. Aside from Martz's homer, the locals were held scoreless after the opening stanza. In the 6th, Krape walked and McCauley singled, to bring Lamar's total of runs for the game to six. Jamison fanned four and allowed one free trip to first. While McCauley was unable to fan any of the local batsmen, he held them to a total of five hits, to win with comparative ease.

**MARTZ FANS IS TO DOWN "GAPPERS" HERE, SATURDAY**

With Paul Martz fanning 13 men, Centre Hall turned in a 5-3 victory over Pleasant Gap here Saturday, as the locals put over four runs in the first inning.

Each team had eight hits, but all of Pleasant Gap's were of the one-base variety, while White, Gap hurler, was found for a triple by Goodhart, the first man to face him.

Rimney doubled in the second, and reached home when Goodhart sacrificed, scoring the local's fifth counter before the game was fairly under way.

Battling in the leadoff position, Goodhart opened Centre Hall's hitting with a long drive that carried the ball over the left fielder's head, for a 3-bagger. Crawford stepped to the plate and cracked out a hit. Bradford fanned.

Knarr was hit by a pitched ball, Paul Martz hit another single, and Ernie Frank duplicated his feat, giving Centre Hall an early-inning lead which was never challenged.

Pleasant Gap scored first in the game, as Myers and Herman singled in the first half of the opening stanza. They repeated in the fifth, when White was walked, and was helped around the bases by sloppy fielding on the part of Centre Hall, ultimately scoring the Gap's second counter.

Gettig and Herman each singled in the sixth to score the losing team's third run. Herman and Myers led the Gap hitters, the former having a pair of singles, and the latter, three safeties. Paul Martz and Ernie Frank each had a pair of hits, Goodhart tripled and Rimney doubled, and Crawford and Ralph Martz each gathered one single. Ralph Martz, playing short stop, turned in a good performance afield. Both pitchers went the route.

**MILLHEIM WINS FIRST HALF; DOWNS REBERSBURG 3-2**

Two costly errors gave Millheim the championship of the first half at Hecla Tuesday afternoon, as last year's champions turned in a 3-2 victory over Rebersburg in the playoff series, to annex the title.

Gienn Aumiller and Roy Rager battled it out on the mound before an overflow crowd, with the Rebersburgians being able to gather but five hits, while Rager's delivery was found for eight safeties, two of them doubles.

Short-stop Hanson scored both of the loser's runs, one in the opening stanza and one in the sixth, both times after he had hit for three bases. Keister scored first for Millheim, reaching first on a scratch hit, and advancing when A. Evans joined him on the circuit as a result of Hanson's error. Then with two men down, Paul Bierly, second baseman, fumbled a slow grounder hit by Aumiller and let in two runs.

Millheim scored again in the fourth, Schure reaching first on a fielder's choice and home on Harold Evans' double.

Aumiller fanned ten to Rager's three and the losing pitcher walked two. Hanson, with two triples, and Tyson, with a double and a single, were the big guns for the losers, while every Millheim player got one hit except Brown, the Evans brothers annexing each a double.

Tuesday's victory gives Millheim a crack at the seasonal championship, for now they must play a series with the second-half victors this fall.

**CENTRE HALL BALL TEAM ELECTS RIMNEY MANAGER**

George Rimney was unanimously elected manager of Centre Hall's baseball club on Monday evening in a meeting of the local team. He succeeded Ralph T. Hess who resigned prior to the meeting.

Rimney was last year captain of the locals and played first base occasionally during the past season. During this season, he has appeared again as first baseman, and more recently as regular catcher for the team, in the absence of Wilbur Stover.

Mr. Hess took over the managerial position at the beginning of this season, and was at the helm during the first half of the season, but decided that his duties in that capacity interfered too much with his business. Rimney will finish his term of office, which expires this fall, at which time he may be re-elected, or succeeded by a new manager.
