Ray Dutrow, who became three years old this month, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dutrow, is improving nicely from the effects of a broken leg sustained four weeks ago, although the lad's limb remains in a plaster cast and will do so for two weeks longer. He suffered but slightly, and is quoted as being happy all day long. Bids for the construction of a concrete pavement on State Highway Route No. 322, between the Mifflin-Centre county line and Potters Mills, a distance of over two miles, are now being asked and will be opened on August 17th. More definite reference to the probable construction of this section of road was made in the Reporter of an earlier issue. McCOOL.—Charles Luther McCool passed out of this life, on Saturday, most unexpectedly at his home in Spring Mills. He had been filling a ditch in which he had previously laid a pipe, during that day's intense heat, when he made his first complaint. Coming to the house, he at once informed Mrs. McCool, who summoned the family physician. All possible medical aid was rendered, but to no avail; the man of middle life yielded to a heart attack.

The deceased was a son of David M. and Mary, Witmer McCool and was born in Union county. He was twice married—first to Miss Amy Ruhl, now deceased, and sixteen years ago his marriage to Miss Grace Ripka, daughter of the late Adam Ripka, was consummated. There were no children to either union, but there survive him a wife, his mother, Mrs. Mary McCool, Spring Mills, and three brothers and sisters: Harry W., Rebersburg; Miss Rae and James P., Spring Mills; Miss Lottie and Ruth, wife of Simon P. Springer, Millheim; Catharine, wife of Max D. Harshbarger, and Roland D., Altoona.

Funeral services were held Tuesday forenoon at the home, with burial at Centre Hall, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe being the minister in charge, with Rev. J. M. Zang of the Evangelical church assisting.

Mr. McCool was born September 12, 1889, and was therefore aged 44 years, 7 months and 9 days. About four years ago he experienced a mishap while employed in the Sheffield milk plant at Spring Mills, which resulted in the amputation of one of his lower limbs. For some time past he was able to do chores about home, but was shorn of earning power. He was a member of the Lutheran church, and the orders of I. O. O. F. and P. O. S. of A. He was a good citizen and up to four years ago a man of unusual physique. His demise is much regretted among a large circle of friends and relatives.
