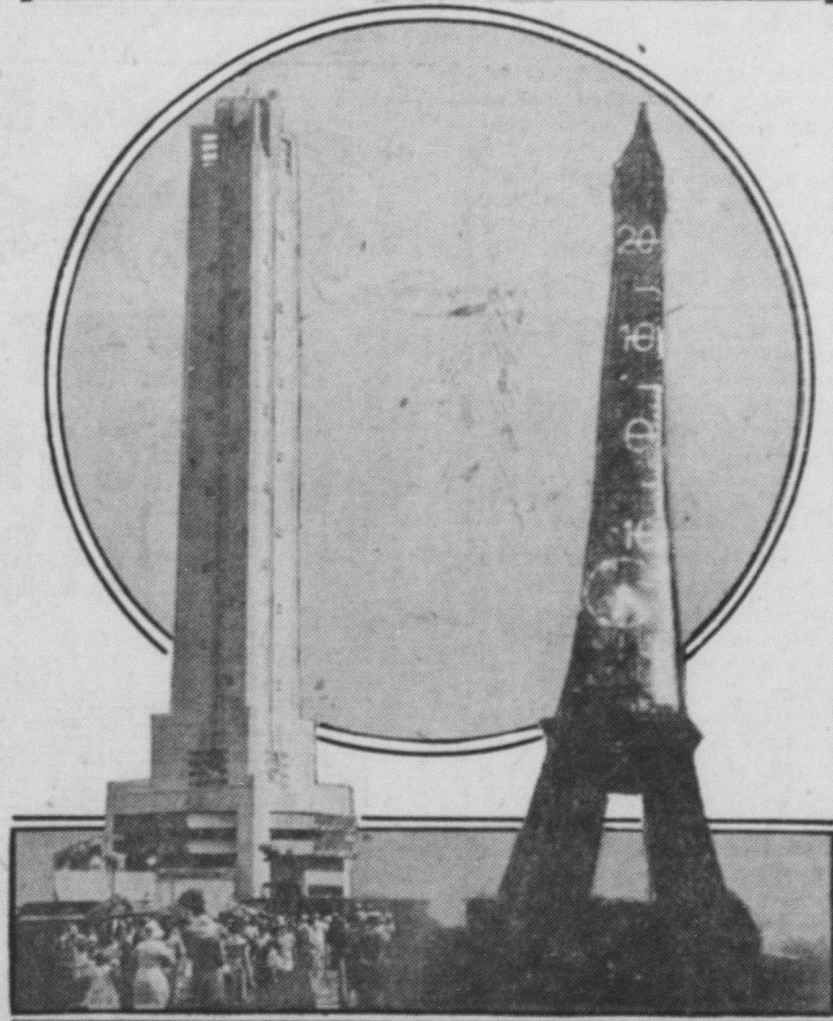

Eiffel Tower Now a Thermometer, as French Adapt World's Fair Idea



The giant Havoline Thermometer proved such an outstanding feature of the Century of Progress in Chicago last year that its basic principles have been copied for the famous Eiffel Tower in Paris. Christened as a "monument to Chicago's climate," the neon-lighted numerals of the American structure will be visible again this year at the World's Fair.

Here is the Eiffel Tower as it appears with its new electrical thermometer, installed by an enterprising French auto manufacturer. French visitors to the World's Fair returned with the idea for a Paris duplicate. The figures are visible for miles. The tower itself is a product of a fair, having been built for the Paris Exposition in 1889.

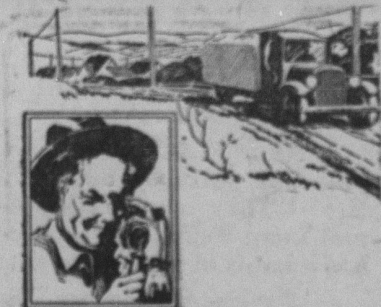
