BELLEFONTE ACADEMY TO BE SOLD BY SHERIFF, SEFT. 14

All of the real estate owned by the Bellefonte Academy and School of Aeronautics, Inc., formerly the Bellfonte Academy, will be sold at 10 o'clock Friday morning, September 14, ending a chapter in the history of an institution that was founded in 1806. The Fidelity Trust Company of Pittsburgh, was foreclosed its mortgage of \$55,-212.52 on the Academy property. All of the buildings, the main building, the infirmary, Professor Hughes' residence, the Quaker manse, the residence formerly occupied by the Charles Hughes family, and the stone house on the corner of Spring and Bishop Streets, and the land comprising the athletic field on East Bishop street, are included.

FOUR INJURED IN CRASH NEAR STATE COLLEGE, THURSDAY

Several persons received injuries on Thursday evening on Route 322, one mile from State College, when a car operated by Earl Y. King, of Lewistown, was struck by a car operated by Chalmer R. Sanderson, of Julian. Sanderson entered the highway from the right, striking the King car, causing it to swing out of line and turn over.
