GUFFEY.—Member War Industries Board, Council of National Defense, Petroleum War Service Committee.

REED.—Major, 311th Field Artillery. Although a veteran he voted wrong on every veterans' bill brought before him.

JOSEPH F. GUFFEY, Democratic candidate for United States Senate, gave up his private business when war was declared and was called to Washington, as a Dollar-A-Year Man, by President Wilson.

GEORGE H. EARLE, who resigned as United States Minister to Austria to become Democratic candidate for Governor, saw his first war service in 1916.

CITATION: "For distinguished services in the line of his profession as Commanding Officer of the U. S. S. Victor on the occasion of a fire on board that vessel at sea when, due to his heroic and inspiring leadership, coolness and prompt action, the ship was saved and no lives lost."

For the President, JOSEPHUS DANIELS, Secretary of the Navy.

DAVID A. REED—Republican candidate for the United States Senate, was a Major in the 311th Field Artillery, from 1917 to 1919, but in spite of his service record has consistently opposed veterans' relief measures in the Senate.

The contract price calls for grading, and drainage and the constructing of a reinforced concrete arch, 136 feet long, fourteen feet wide and ten feet high, to accommodate a small creek.

When completed, U. S. Route No. 322 will have a continuous concrete surface from Reedsville north to the intersection of U. S. Route 220 at Martha Furnace.

Grading, it is understood, is to begin at once.
