THE COUNTY AGENT SAYS COOL MILK TO 40 DEGREES Experiments conducted by the department of agricultural engineering at the Pennsylvania State College showed conclusively that if a 10-gallon can of milk cooled to 40 degrees Fahrenheit is placed outside where the air temperature is approximately 70 degrees this milk will warm up to the average at the rate of three degrees an hour.

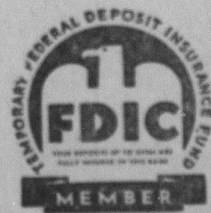

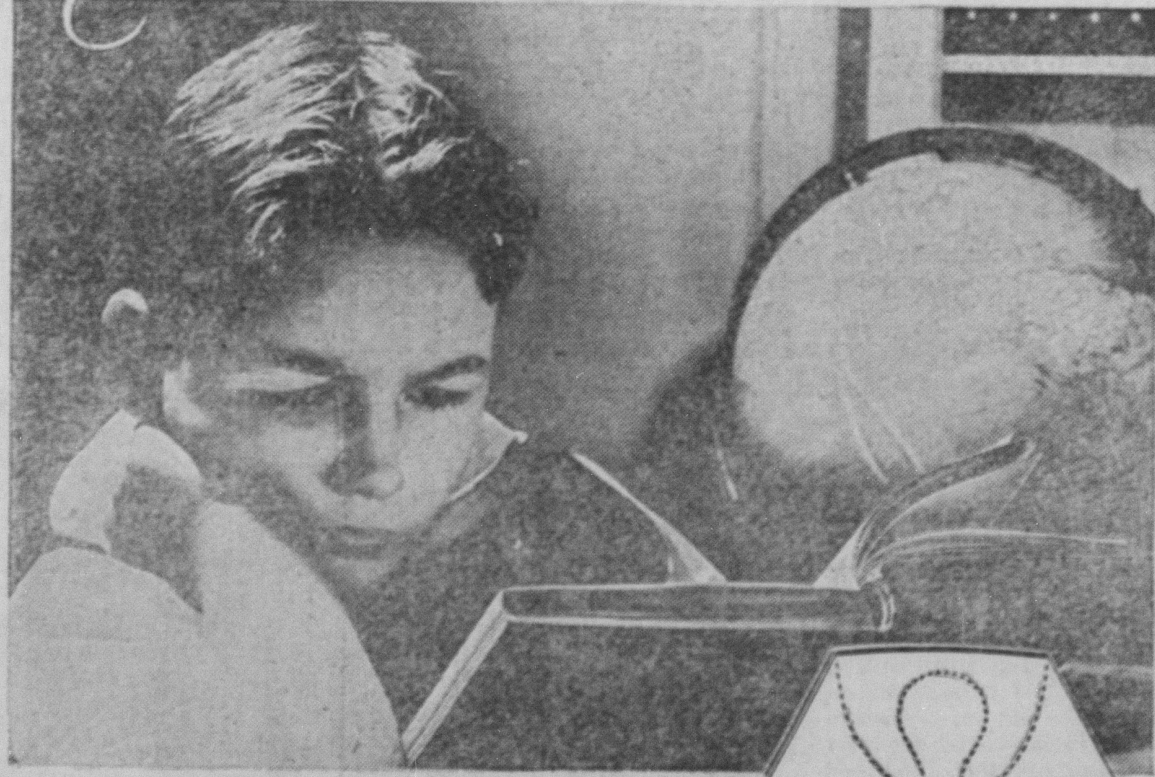

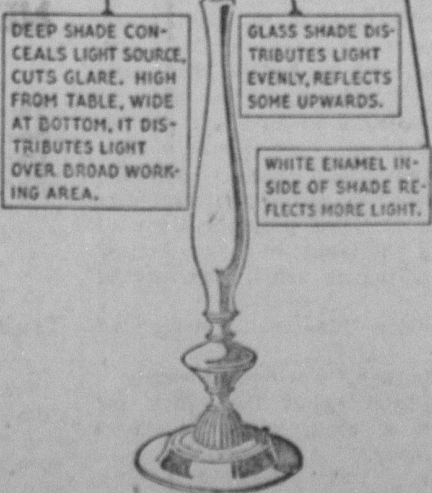
