VANDALS FORCE ENTRANCE TO TWO HIGH SCHOOLS

Sunday night, the Centre Hall High school building was entered through a window, by unknown persons, and considerable damage done to valuable steel filing cabinets. A quantity of candy, to the value of \$2.50, which was on sale for the benefit of the athletic association, was stolen, while a greater quantity was left behind, although scattered on the floor. Three steel filing cabinets were forced open and the contents disturbed. Doubtless the robbers were seeking money, which they failed to find. Departure from the building was made by unbolting the rear door.

Footprints on the soft earth outside the building indicate one of the two robbers wore army shoes. The job was undoubtedly an "outside" one.

Charles Musser, janitor of the East Penns Valley High school building, found it ransacked Monday morning, entrance having been gained through a cellar window by the removal of a screen and window frame. Every portion of the building was gone through and a thorough search made of cases and drawers. Nothing was missing except a bundle of a dozen lead pencils. It is presumed the thieves were after money, since it was generally known that funds obtained through the sale of Christmas seals were kept in the building. The cache containing the Christmas seal money was not found. There is a possibility that the robbery was committed by the same parties who entered the Centre Hall High school building the same night, as it appears cash was the thing they wanted in both cases.

An auto wreck that resulted in sending two to a hospital occurred early Sunday morning at the end of the concrete pavement at the Shamokin hunting lodge, Seven Mountains.
