BARLE'S CABINET COMPLETED

With the appointment of a Secretary of Labor and Industry, Secretary of Mines and Insurance Commissioner, on Saturday evening, the Barle cabinet has been completed.

The Governor-elect likewise announced the appointment of former State Representative Norbert J. Fitzgerald, of Erie, as member of the Workmen's Compensation Board.

The chairmanship of the board and the third membership will probably be filled this week. Richard J. Beamish, Secretary of the Commonwealth in the Pinchot administration, who resigned to stump the State for the Guffy-Earle ticket, has been mentioned for the chairmanship.

The Cabinet positions each pay \$10,000 a year, and membership in the Compensation Board \$8500.

Deaths

BLOOM.—Robert Wesley Bloom, a Potter township farmer, died very suddenly at his home west of Centre Hall on Thursday evening at about 9:00 o'clock.

SHATTUCK.—Mrs. Elizabeth M. Stuart Shattuck, wife of Prof. Harold B. Shattuck, long prominent in affairs at State College, died at her home on Christmas day after a critical illness. Funeral services were held from her home on Thursday afternoon following her death.

WOLFE.—Rev. David J. Wolfe was found dead in bed Monday at his home in Homestead. He had retired, but sat up in bed to read, and it was in that position he was found.

BACON.—Miss Grace Bacon, assistant professor of nutrition extension at Penn State, died in a Harrisburg hospital from the effects of injuries received in an automobile wreck. She was 44 years old.

GILL.—Oscar Gill, a life long resident of Giltown, near Pleasant Gap, died at his home of pneumonia following a week's illness.

BREON.—Mrs. John H. Breon died Tuesday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. Cloyd Brooks, on Rhoneymede farm, west of Old Fort, after an illness of a month from complications, due at least to some extent to her advanced age.

YORDY.—Mrs. Catharine Summers Yordy, a daughter of David and Amelia Roush Summers, late of Aaronsburg, deceased, died in Shamokin, aged 75 years, where she lived during most of her life.

ISHLER.—After an illness extending over a considerable period of time, due to uremic poisoning, Peter Sylvester Ishler died at his home in Boalsburg, Wednesday morning, Dec. 26.

HELLER.—Jacob A. Heller, long engaged in Rebersburg as a blacksmith, died at his home in that place at the age of 81 years.

DEARING.—Jesse Edward Dearing died at his home near Colyer, and on Sunday, Dec. 23, was laid to rest in a cemetery at Petersburg.

RHOADS.—Miss Rebecca Rhoads, Washington D. C., native of Centre county and since the early twenties leader of the dry forces of the county, died at her home in the capital city, Wednesday evening of last week following a long illness.

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MASTER DE LUXE APPEARANCE OF NEW CHEVROLET CAR

Visually, the new Master DeLuxe retains only the characteristic outlines of the radiator, and the familiar trade-mark on hub caps and radiator emblem, to indicate it is of Chevrolet origin. The V-radiator itself is narrower and more sloping, the unit fenders are highly contoured in their stamining, while the windshield not only slopes back steeply but also is slightly V-shaped, causing all the forepart of the car to flow smoothly into the body, which is the utmost in smoothness.

Every detail of the car is new, starting with the front bumper and including the radiator grill, the ornament that supplants the radiator filling cap (now under the hood), the horizontal hood louvers, the runningboard pattern, streamlined door handles, spare tire mountings (concealed in some models), tail lamp, and rear bumper. Aside from appearance there are important improvements in body comfort and spaciousness, and especially in the ride.

The wheelbase of the new Master De Luxe is increased to 113 inches, and an even greater increase in body space has been gained by moving the engine forward. The appearance of great length has been enhanced by lowering the floor level, dropping it one inch nearer the ground by lowering the chassis side rails.

The Master De Luxe sport and town sedans have integral trunks embedded in the rear panels, with compartments for the spare wheel. In the three sedans, pressed steel wheels with short rounded spokes are regular equipment. Wire wheels with large hub caps are used on the other models.
