PUBLICITY AS PUBLIC PROTECTION. House Bill No. 94, introduced in the Legislature at Harrisburg by Representative Leo A. Achterman, Strasburg, Monroe county, changes the method of imposing and collecting the mercantile tax and eliminates mercantile appraisers, setting up a system whereby the Department of Revenue would bill and collect this tax.

BRACHBILL.—William R. Brachbill, a leading Bellefonte merchant, died on Saturday in the home in which he was born on June 3, 1856. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Brachbill church officiating.

MUSSER.—Death claimed one of Centre county's best-known citizens Thursday afternoon when Philip Musser, prominent Millheim resident, succumbed after an illness of more than a year. Death occurred at his late home at 5 p. m.

KEEN.—William Edwin Keen, highly respected citizen of Millheim, died at his home in that place Thursday morning following an illness of four days. Death was caused by a paralytic stroke.

BRUNGART.—Jeremiah Brungart died at his home in Rebersburg, aged 74 years, 10 months and 22 days. He was a son of Jacob and Sarah Cornman Brungart. He is survived by a wife, formerly Tena Lamey, also by a daughter, Mrs. Anna Miller, of Pile-gram. Interment was made at Rebersburg.

SHULTZ.—Franklin H. Shultz, 74, a retired farmer, of Rebersburg, died at his home there Tuesday afternoon of last week, after an illness of three weeks' duration.

DANN.—Mrs. Anna Louise Dann, wife of Joseph F. Dann, died in Waverly, N. Y., on Thursday. The body was brought to Bellefonte, on Saturday, where interment was made. The deceased was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Powers. She is survived by her husband and mother. Her age was thirty-six years.

FISHER.—Mrs. George Fisher, aged 52, of Snydertown, died Thursday afternoon of last week from the effects of a paralytic stroke suffered twelve hours previously. Mrs. Fisher was a daughter of James and Margaret Gumsallus, of Blandford, and was a younger daughter of a large family of boys and girls. Her mother, past 90 years of age, who has been an invalid, and blind for fifteen years, resides with a daughter, Mrs. John W. Delany, near Centre Hall, and is now ill. Mrs. Fisher spent the past week with them, assisting in caring for her mother, being in her usual health. She is survived by her husband, two daughters and a number of brothers, sisters, nephews and nieces, besides her aged mother. Funeral services were held in the Evangelical church, Sunday morning, conducted by the Rev. M. A. Herman, after which interment was made in the Huberburg cemetery.
