Deaths

ARMSTRONG.—Joshua Armstrong died instantly, Monday morning, at the Whitrock Stone Quarry works at Pleasant Gap, where he was employed. He appeared for work as usual, and on passing Ward Showers, Showers casually asked him, "How are you this morning?", to which Armstrong replied, "Never felt better in my life." Showers walked on, but in a few minutes returned over his tracks and was almost stunned to find his companion had fallen to the floor and was dead.

The deceased was born in Spring township, Sept. 12, 1864, making his age 70 years, 5 months and 6 days. He was a son of Joshua and Sarah Stover Armstrong, both deceased. He was a former resident of Centre Hall. There survive him his wife, Margaret Weaver, and two children—Harry, Pleasant Gap, and Mrs. George Wise, of Bellefonte.

GENTZEL.—George Gentzel, for twenty-five years a resident of Spring Mills, and probably the oldest resident on the south side of Centre county, died at 11:00 o'clock Monday evening, after an illness of some time. Funeral services will be held Saturday morning, 10:00 o'clock, at the home, Rev. J. W. Zang, of the Evangelical church, to officiate.

The deceased was a son of William and Catharine Krader Gentzel, and was born in Georges Valley where he lived until retiring from active farm life and locating in Spring Mills. He is survived by a wife who was Miss Caroline Erbe, and is but a few months younger than her husband. Also, by these children: Ambrose, of Shamokin; Roland, of Altoona; Grover, of Harrisburg; Miss Carrie, at home. A daughter, Catharine, died many years ago.

The exact age of the deceased was 91 years, 10 months and 23 days. He was long a member of the Evangelical church.

LANSBERRY.—James Henry Lansberry, born August 13, 1934, died from pneumonia at the home of his parents, William and Marian Glasgow Lansberry, on Thursday. GREEN.—Miss Emma C. Green died at her home in Bellefonte Thursday morning, following an illness with a complication of diseases. She was born in Bellefonte 72 years ago. She is survived by one brother, J. Calvin Green, of Charleroi.

She was a lifelong member of the St. Paul's A. M. E. church. Funeral services were held from the home Saturday afternoon, the Rev. J. B. Easley, pastor of the A. M. E. church officiating. Burial was made in the Union cemetery.

WILLIAMS.—John Albert Williams, aged 60 yrs., born in Boalsburg, a son of George W. and Mary Musser Williams, both deceased, died recently in Philadelphia. Burial was made in Arlington cemetery.

He was married on September 1, 1928, to Madeline Lyons, of Altoona, who survives with one child, Barbara 5. One sister, Mary Katharine Corli, completes the members of the immediate family surviving.

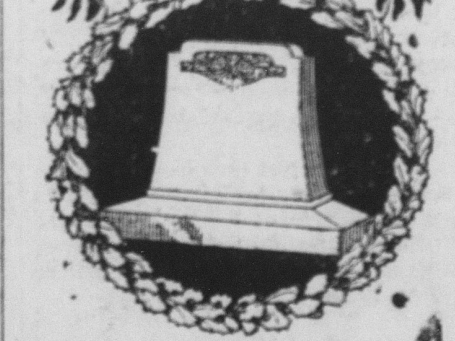
