Deaths

CONDO—John C. Condo, one of Gregg township's best known citizens, died suddenly Friday evening at the home of his daughter, Sarah K., in an apartment in the Richelleu building, Bellefonte, following a paralytic stroke suffered on the morning of the day previous. Mr. Condo had been spending some time with his daughter, Miss Clara, in Altoona, and on coming to Bellefonte related to his friends how well he felt for a man of almost eighty-four.

Funeral services were held from the home of his son, J. Russell Condo, in Spring Mills, Sunday afternoon, 3:00 o'clock, his pastor, Rev. G. A. Fred Griesing officiating; burial in the Salem Reformed church cemetery, east of Penn Hall.

The surviving members of the family are Mrs. E. N. Meyer, Mrs. John F. Musser, Sara K. Condo and Bernadine Condo, all of Bellefonte; Clara L. Condo, Altoona, and J. Russell Condo, Spring Mills.

Surviving brothers and sisters are John P. Condo, Aaronburg; Jonathan P. Condo, Howard, and Mrs. James Roush, Aaronburg.

Mrs. Condo died January 26th, 1935. Mr. Condo lived at Spring Mills during all of his mature life, except for the periods spent with his children during his latter years. Prior to the advent of the automobile he made the building of light vehicles—buggies and carriages—his specialty and had built up an extensive trade throughout Central Pennsylvania.

Mr. Condo was a staunch Democrat and at the time of his death was serving his second term as jury commissioner. He was highly regarded as a citizen and due to his most genial disposition his association was sought by his acquaintances.

The Commemorative Biographical Record of Central Pennsylvania, 1394, refers to Mr. Condo in this manner: "Mr. Condo, a blacksmith and wagon and carriage dealer of Penn Hall, is a representative of one of the old families of Penna Valley. He was born in Gregg township, April 23rd, 1851, the second son and third child of Daniel and Sarah (Lutz) Condo. The father, Daniel Condo, was also born in Gregg township, April 29, 1822. He married Rebecca Schaeffer. At the opening of the Civil War he was farming in George's Valley and served in the Union Army almost three years.

Our subject, James C. Condo, began his education under the direction of Fredrick Jamison, and after completing the elementary studies in the district schools became a student in Penn Hall Academy. At eleven years of age he worked as an errand boy at the Penn Hall hotel, and in the winter of 1863-1864, he was employed by George Dale, near Lemont. A year later he began the blacksmith trade in his father's shop. After working with several others, he entered the employ of Daniel Geary in Penn township. Subsequently he purchased his employer's shop and for ten years engaged in blacksmithing there. In March of 1879, he purchased a property from J. B. Fisher, at Penn Hall, and retained his residence and smithy there.

Mr. Condo married Miss Jennie Wolf of Penn township. Mr. Condo votes the Democratic party ticket. Socially he belongs to the Masonic fraternity, and in religious faith he is identified with the Reformed church. His life has been successful, and he may well be proud of his achievements."

The deceased was born at Zion on July 8, 1850. She was a faithful member of the Evangelical church at Zion.
