GREGG TOWNSHIP VOCATIONAL SCHOOL NOTES. Seniors to Present Class Play, Apr. 12. The annual senior class play of the Gregg Township Vocational school will be given in the Spring Mills Grange hall on Friday, April 12th, at 8:00 p. m.

Members of the Spring Mills Athletic Association and students of G. T. V. S. are working at putting the athletic field in shape for the coming baseball season.

The entrance examination for eighth grade students of the Gregg Twp. Vocational school will be held in the grammar room at Spring Mills, Thursday, April 18, at 9:00 a. m. Only 8th grade pupils are entitled to take this examination.

Attendance in the Spring Mills schools was greatly reduced during the past month due to the large number of boys and girls who had measles. It is felt that the peak has been passed at this time and attendance should improve throughout the month.

BRUNGART.—Mrs. Dolly Jane Brungart, widow of Cyrus Brungart, died Saturday morning, after an illness of long duration, finally terminating in pneumonia.

The deceased was the youngest daughter of William and Mary Stover Emerick, long deceased, and was born December 1, 1852, on the Emerick (now John Delaney) homestead, east of Centre Hall.

The only survivor of the Emerick family is Mrs. Carrie Ruhl, at the National Lutheran Home for the Aged, in Washington, D. C. Three survivors, however, the eldest of two daughters, Sarah, wife of J. S. Getchell, of Uniontown; also four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from the home of Mrs. Emma Emerick, a sister-in-law of the deceased, on Wednesday afternoon, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, pastor of the local Lutheran church, of which denomination she was a member from early life.

The deceased was aged 82 years, 3 months and 29 days.

HECKMAN.—Adam Perr Heckman died Tuesday morning at the home of his son, Archie Heckman, Spring Mills, from whose home funeral services will be held on Friday morning, and burial made in the Georges Valley cemetery, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, pastor of the deceased, will conduct the funeral services.

The deceased was a son of John and Sarah Bright Heckman and was born in Gregg township, Nov. 10, 1866, making his age at death 68 years, 4 months and 21 days. He was a farmer during earlier life, but upon the death of Mrs. Heckman a number of years ago discontinued that occupation.

There survive the deceased these children: Amy, Mrs. Archie Moyer, of Centre Hall; Sarah, Mrs. Herbert Hartwick, State College; Grace, Mrs. Paul Wert, Patton; Alice, Mrs. John Dutrow, Centre Hall; Florence, Mrs. Clarence Weaver, Lemont; Miss Cora, State College; Miss Gladys, R. N. of York; and Archie, Spring Mills. There also survive the deceased two brothers and a sister, John C. A. Heckman, Daniel W. Heckman, and Mrs. Thomas J. Decker, all of Spring Mills.

Several weeks ago Mr. Heckman was stricken with paralysis while with his daughter, Mrs. Moyer, after which time he gradually grew weaker. He was taken to the home of the son where he died, during the latter part of that week.

CONDO.—Amanda Wilson Condo, daughter of John and Sara Hubler Wilson Condo, born at Zion, August 20, 1858, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jane Treaster, in Lewistown, on Thursday, from complications.

The deceased was a member of the Allensville Lutheran church. Her age was 76 years, 7 months and 3 days.

The husband of the deceased, Lott A. Condo, died December 28, 1933.

SWIFT.—An automobile accident in which a State College resident, Joseph A. Swift, was instantly killed, occurred Sunday morning in Pittsburgh. The car in which Mr. Swift was riding was hit by a car coming from a side street. Two others were badly injured. The body was brought to State College and funeral services held from the home of the father, Joseph A. Swift, Sr., and interment made in Phillipsburg, on Tuesday.

Deceased was aged 42 years, and is survived by a wife and two children.

Miss Potter had been in poor health for years. She was born in Harris township, October 13, 1842, a daughter of Robert and Nancy Potter. Surviving are two nieces, the Misses Agnes and Bertha Campbell, both of State College, and Isaac Campbell, a nephew at Pennsylvania Furnace, with whom she made her home. She was a member of the Methodist church.

RIDER.—Michael George, son of Michael and Roxanna (Eiters) Rider, died at the parental home near Coburn, aged eight months. The parents and a sister survive him. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery, Aaronsburg.

BIERLY.—Lowell Stanford Bierly, 57, a farmer and lifelong resident of Smulton and vicinity, died at his farm home there from pneumonia. His wife, formerly Miss Carrie Weaver, survives him, as do also Jasper Bierly, and Mrs. Orpha Bennett, both of

Smulton. He is also survived by two grandchildren and a sister and a half-brother; Mrs. Forrest Ocker, of State College, and Wallace Bierly, of Rebersburg.

Burial was made at Rebersburg, Rev. J. J. Weaver, Lutheran pastor, officiating.

HASSINGER.—Sarah Jane Hassinger, wife of Joseph Hassinger, died at her home at Coburn from diabetes. She was the daughter of Franklin and Catharine Eisenhuth Allen and was born May 1, 1873, making her age at the time of her death 61 years, 10 months and 29 days.

Burial was made at Millheim on Tuesday afternoon.

HOUTZ.—Walter Jacob Houtz died at his home at Pleasant Gap. Funeral services were held on Monday, with burial at Pleasant Gap. The deceased was born in Millfin county, September 26, 1892, and consequently was aged 42 years, 6 months and 3 days.

PENNSYLVANIA FARMERS PLAN FEW CHANGES IN CROPS

Pennsylvania farmers are planning to harvest about the same acreage of important crops during 1935 as a year ago, according to the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service.

The acreage of corn, oats, potatoes and hay indicated for harvest this year is 4,735,000 compared to 4,732,000 in 1934. The corn acreage is expected to be slightly larger than last year, but the oats and potato acreage will be smaller. No change is anticipated in hay or tobacco.

In the entire country, increases in acreage harvested are anticipated for most of the important spring-planted crops excepting potatoes in which a slight reduction is expected compared with 1934.
