FLOREY.—Robert S. Florey died at his home on the Treaster place, along Sinking creek, near Potters Mills, on Tuesday, from tuberculosis, at the age of 59 years, 8 months, 29 days. He was a son of Wm. and Emma Wallizer Florey, and was engaged as a laborer.

There survive him a wife, who prior to marriage was Miss Alice Royer, also several children and brothers and sisters. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon from the home of a daughter, Mrs. Frank Phillips, Potters Mills.

HOLTZWORTH.—Howard E. Holtzworth died Thursday morning, of last week at his home in Unionville after an illness of a week, which began with a cold and developed into pneumonia. Although seventy-nine years of age, he was in good physical condition, and had announced officially that he would enter the campaign this summer to succeed himself as a Republican member on the board of county commissioners.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon; burial at Unionville. Deceased was born in Lancaster county, but had lived in this county for fifty years. A wife, formerly Maggie Blair, and three children, an adopted daughter, Mrs. Frances DeLong, of Bristol; Charles, of Freedom, W. Va., and Blair, of Enfield, survive.

Mr. Holtzworth was appointed a county commissioner in 1927 to succeed the late Mr. Austin, by Judge Harry Keller. He resigned and became a candidate for county treasurer, but was unsuccessful at the polls. He was a candidate for commissioner in 1931, and was elected the minority member.

HOY.—Harvey Smith Hoy, aged 79, died at his home in Nittany Valley, near Hubersburg, Wednesday of last week. He had been confined to bed since a fall last December. Mr. Hoy was a retired farmer. He was born in Centre county.

She was formerly Susan Anderson and was born July 7, 1839, which date was twenty-seven years after the first settlers located in what is now Beech Creek.

1934 HUNTING ACCIDENTS.—During 1934 there were twenty-eight fatal hunting accidents in Pennsylvania. Eleven of these were self-inflicted, and the remainder, 17, were inflicted by others. Eight of the victims of self-inflicted wounds, were under 21 years of age, and twenty were over that age. The accidents occurred: In field, 7; brush, 8; open woodland, 5; dense woodland; 6; conveyance, 2.

The total hunting licenses sold during 1934 were 577,111. The ratio of hunting accidents to licenses sold was 1 to every 2035.9 hunters afield.

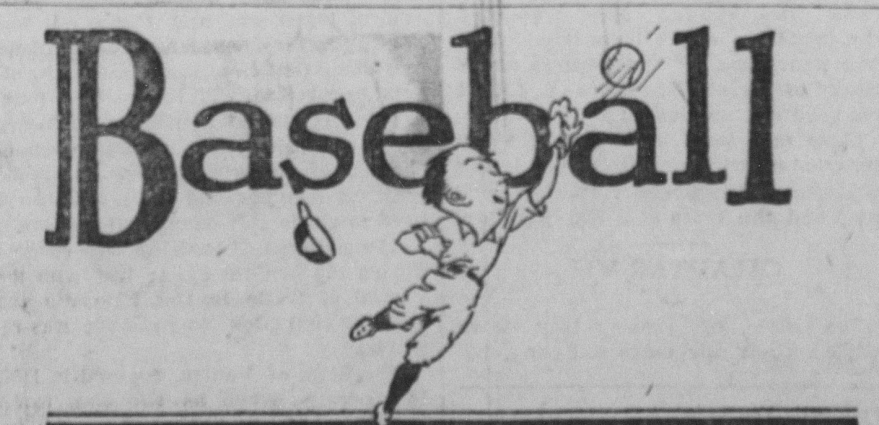
