Deaths

DELANEY.—Michael Delaney, aged 46, of Nittany, R. D., a World War veteran, was instantly killed Friday morning above the bridge on Route 220 at Mill Hall, when struck by a car operated by Reginald Walizer, of Mackeyville, which was traveling toward Mill Hall. Walizer was accompanied by Harold Hager, of Lock Haven.

Delaney was walking toward Cedar Springs, in the same direction in which the car was traveling, when, apparently blinded by the lights of a car just passed, he stepped directly in the path of the Walizer car. Walizer took him to the office of Dr. A. B. Painter, at Mill Hall. He was pronounced dead upon arrival.

Dr. W. J. Shoemaker, of Lock Haven, Clinton county coroner, stated that Delaney must have been instantly killed. He suffered internal injuries, a fracture of the skull, and a compound fracture of the right leg between the knee and the ankle. Delaney was a resident of Nittany Valley for many years, where for a long time he had been employed on the farm of Miss Esther Hayes. He was unmarried, and a member of the Catholic church.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. John Delaney, of Nittany, R. D.; five brothers and two sisters: John, of Nittany; James, Vincent and Daniel, of Lock Haven; Joseph, of Salona; Mrs. Catherine Furl, of Runville; Mrs. Louise Myers and Miss Mary Delaney, at home.

The deceased was a cousin of Michael, John W. and Thomas F. Delaney, living near Centre Hall. Funeral services were held Monday morning in the Bellefonte Catholic church, with burial at Howard.

SHOWERS.—Mrs. Mary Agnes Showers, wife of J. H. Showers, died at her home in Greenburr of a heart condition. She had been ill about two years. Three sons and daughters survive: George Showers, Spring Mills; Mrs. Mabel Brungart, Lock Haven; and Ammon L. SHAFER.—Albert L. Shaffer, a resident of Zion, died on Saturday from complications, aged 79 years. He was a son of Wm. and Louisa Grimm Shaffer, and was born at Madisonburg. In 1878, the deceased was wedded to Alice Feldler, who survives her husband, as do also these children: Mrs. John H. Burkholder, Centre Hall, H. D.; Mrs. Earl Shreckengast and Wm. D. Shaffer, Zion. Interment was made at Zion on Tuesday; services having been held at the home by Rev. James B. Musser. Mr. Shaffer was supervisor in Walker township for twenty-five years, a man of kind disposition and affectionate as a husband and father.

GRAMLEY.—An educator, churchman and outstanding citizen of Centre county died on Monday morning in the passing out of Cephas Luther Gramley, at his home in Rebersburg, following a long illness, due largely to age, which was 82 years, 8 months. His birth took place near Rebersburg; the parents, Samuel and Sarah Small Gramley, are long deceased.

The foundation of his education was laid in the township school and finished in the Missionary Institute, now Susquehanna University. He began teaching in the public schools at a tender age, and became principal of several high schools. At the closing of the County Normals, which schools were displaced by the State Teachers' Colleges, Mr. Gramley opened a "Select School" in Rebersburg, conducting it along the lines of the former County Normals.

In 1892 Dr. Waller, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, appointed him County Superintendent to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of D. O. Eiters. He was a staunch Republican and was elected by his party to the legislature in 1912.

As a churchman he was closely allied to the Lutheran denomination, filling many offices by election and appointment in his parish, conference and synod. Fraternally he was a member of the I. O. O. F. and was a trustee of the Orphans' Home in Sunbury. Financially his greatest interest was in banking, and he became first vice-president of the Farmers' National Bank and Trust Company, Millheim.

Miss Joanna Weaver, now deceased, became the wife of Mr. Gramley in 1879. There survive him a daughter, Mrs. M. C. Haines, Rebersburg, and a grandson, Kenneth Haines. Also these brothers and sisters: T. M. Gramley, Millheim; Clement H. Gramley, Rebersburg; Mrs. Naomi Heckman, Ridgway, and Mrs. W. T. Hubler, Rebersburg.

He was a son of Samuel Strong and Nancy Reed and was born in Millin county, May 5, 1860, making his age at the time of death 75 years, 15 days. His wife, Louise Confer, is deceased. There were no children, but a sister, Mrs. Emma Walters, Milroy, survives him.
