Pennsylvania's Caves.

Entrance to one of many caverns developed for public exploration in Pennsylvania. Excellent highways give access and interiors are lighted artistically. This one includes the novelty of subterranean boat travel. It is known as Penns Cave, and is located near Centre Hall.

One of the tourist attractions of Pennsylvania which has been neglected is the geologic features and rock formations of the State.

While other States have broadcast the wonders of its caves and caverns far and wide, Pennsylvania for the most part has remained mute on this class of phenomena, which rivals similar to be found in the United States.

Although it is true that all of the caves and caverns of Pennsylvania are what is known as commercial, similar places in other States are in the same classification with a fee charged for admission.

The development of the Pennsylvania highway system has made a tour to the caves an easy matter and all of them will be found on or near one of the Keystone State's superb highways.

People from Pennsylvania who want to see caves are going to other States by the thousands, while there is just as much to interest them in their own State.

In all there are fourteen caves open for visitors in Pennsylvania.
