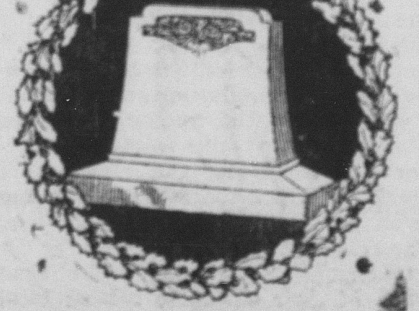

**THE FARMER & MILK**

Cash income from the sale of milk, butterfat and butter by Pennsylvania farmers in 1934 was \$14,393,000 greater than in 1933, according to the estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture. The 1934 total was \$86,900,000.

Pennsylvania ranks third among all states in cash income from dairy products, being exceeded only by Wisconsin and New York.

The Pennsylvania farm price of milk, including both wholesale and retail sales, was estimated at \$2.26 per cwt. in 1934, compared with \$1.92 per cwt. in 1933. These prices are about 50 per cent. higher than the corresponding average for the entire country.

Our increase of \$100,000 in deposits during the last year indicate that at least a share of this increase came to the farmers and business men of this community.
