Under a measure reported from the House, the Centre County hospital will receive \$32,315 for the 1935-1937 biennium. The last appropriation for a similar period was \$29,990. For all state-aid hospitals the sum of \$8,634,294 was appropriated in the bill, \$1,000,000 over that devoted to the same cause two years ago.
