Ruth, 6 was playing ,353 ball, when both she and a small dog .353 at the same time ran to retrieve the 294 ball, and in the mixup the dog snap-.118 ped the child. The wound was given surgical attention by Dr. Morrew, and no ill results are anticipated.

The Centre County Sheep and Wool Growers' Association loaded their crop of 17,000 pounds of wool at a sost of thirteen-hundredths of a cent per lb. Of the total, 1400 was classed as offgrade or rejections. There were 130 producers. It is estimated the association, during the sixteen years of its existence, profited to approximately \$1,-666 by cooperative selling. The quality of the wools has improved, and as a result the buyer of last year's crop was the highest bidder for the 1935
