Trucks delivering farmers' milk and other perishable foods to market have been freed from regulation by the Public Service Commission under the Smith Exemption Law, passed during the last hours of the recent session of the Legislature. The measure frees the farmer from being limited to trucking to prescribed territory; to

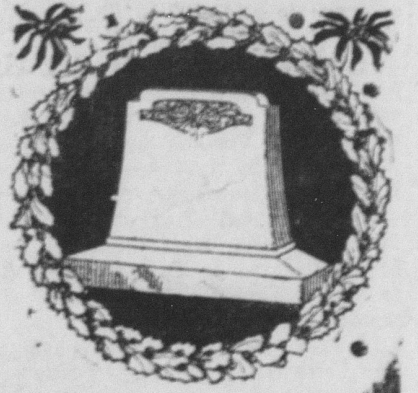
