Deaths

MUSSER.—Harvey Franklin Musser, born in Gregg township, died in the Centre County hospital, where he had been a patient for about a week, on Sunday, July 8, at the age of 75 years, 27 days. Interment was made on Wednesday following in the cemetery at the Sprucecreek church, near Potters Mills. The officiating minister was Rev. Seth Russell, pastor of the Methodist church.

The deceased is survived by a wife, who before marriage was Miss Elizabeth McClintic. There were no children.

Mr. Musser was long a resident of Potter township, his home at the time of death having been but a short distance east of where his body was laid to rest. He held various township offices, and was repeatedly elected as one of Potter's auditors, a place for which he was particularly fitted. He supported in a most loyal way the Democratic party.

He was a member of Centre Hall Lodge, I. O. O. F. Almost his entire life was spent in farming, and it was only during his later years that he lived in semi-retirement.

DURST.—William Howard Durst died at the Centre County hospital following an operation for sigmoid carcinoma, on Wednesday, July 3rd. The body was removed to his home east of the borough line from where burial was made Friday following, in the cemetery at Centre Hall, Rev. D. R. Keener officiating, with Rev. S. F. Greenhoe and Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick assisting. He was aged 72 years.

The deceased was a son of George and Sabina Shellenberger Durst, and was born in Potter township. When quite a young man he was employed in a railroad office in Chicago, his skill with the pen at that time having no doubt been a factor in his selection. Later he engaged in farming, conducting the homestead farm. For a short time he lived in Union county, and from there located on the place where he died.

He is survived by a wife, formerly Miss Susan Fredericks.

WILLIAMS.—Mrs. Catharine M. Williams, aged 85 years, widow of Isaac R. Williams, died at Howard. Burial was made in Schenck's cemetery.

The survivors include the following children: Harrison and John R., both of Altoona; Shuman, Idella, Henry George, Mrs. William Stolz, and Mrs. William Lucas, all of Howard; two stepsons, L. L. Williams, of Howard, and Charles Williams, of Greencastle.

She also leaves a brother, Shuman Holter, of Howard, and Mrs. Mary Schienck and Mrs. Susan Loder, sisters, also of Howard, in addition to 25 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

KELLER.—Mrs. Tamin L. Keller, widow of the late John Will Keller, died at the Centre County hospital on Wednesday morning of last week of injuries sustained in a fall about a month ago. For some time past she had made her home with her son, Capt. G. Harry Keller, of the highway patrol, at Milesburg, and it was there she fell and broke her hip.

Born at Centre Hall on September 7th, 1858, she was a daughter of George and Mary Miller. Her husband died forty-two years ago, but surviving her are two sons, Capt. Keller, mentioned above, and Wilfred Keller, in Roumania. Also surviving are a brother and two sisters, Robert Miller, of Lena, Ill., Mrs. Ida Williams, of Pine Grove Mills, and Mrs. James Crawford, of Freeport, Ill.

Burial was made at Boalsburg beside the body of her late husband Saturday afternoon; services by Rev. H. L. Wink.

Mrs. Keller was a successful business woman, and followed her deceased husband in the mercantile business at Linden Hall, continuing to go so for many years. During her business career there, lumbering in the Bear Meadows and nearby was at its height, and business in the small village was brisk.

BURRIS.—Charles Sura Burris, former resident of Centre Hall, passed away at his home near Lancaster on Sunday morning, 7th, following a lingering illness since December last, when he contracted pneumonia. Burial was made at Lewisburg Wednesday of last week.

Mr. Burris was born at Woodward, Jan. 4, 1884, hence was aged 51 years, 6 months and 3 days. Twenty or more years ago he farmed the Joshua Potter farm, west of town, and later removed to Dewart where for some years he was employed by Charles Sheffer, ice cream manufacturer. Subsequently he removed to Williamsport and then to Lancaster.

Surviving are his wife who was formerly Anna Sauer, Spring Mills and one daughter, Mrs. Allen Heckert, of Lindley, N. Y.; also two brothers and two sisters, namely, Irvin Burris, Yeagertown; Mrs. Clara Leistler, Lannon Burris, Centre Hall, and Mrs. Ida Sheffer, Altoona.
