ALTOONA NEGRO COSTLY PRISONER FOR CENTRE CO.

On March 9th, State highway patrolman Kauffman arrested Joseph L. Burgess, an Altoona negro, on the charge of stealing the automobile of Mahlon Eby, of Zion. He admitted the theft and was placed in the Centre county jail for safe keeping until he could be brought before the court for disposition of the larceny charge placed against him. However, the county commissioners would have saved considerable money had they turned him loose and bought Eby a new car.

Burgess contracted pneumonia while in jail and his condition became so serious that on May 20th he was taken to the Centre County hospital for treatment. Being a prisoner it was necessary to place a guard over him and former Sheriff E. R. Taylor, John Smith, of Bush's Addition, and Ralph Stover, of Coleville, were appointed guards to serve eight-hour shifts. Complications developed after the pneumonia was broken up and it was not until Monday that Burgess was discharged from the hospital.

During the 78 days he was in the institution the county paid \$5.00 a day to each of the three guards, or a total of \$1170.00. On Tuesday they received a bill from the hospital for \$362.00, making \$1532.00 to date, and they have not received the doctor's bill. If these bills are included in the costs when Burgess faces the court for sentence he is liable to drop dead on the spot.

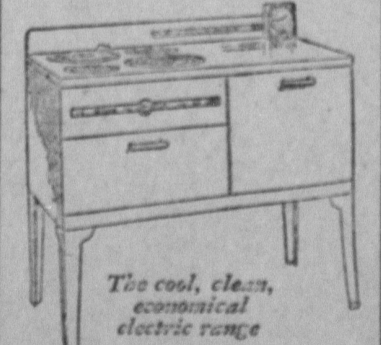

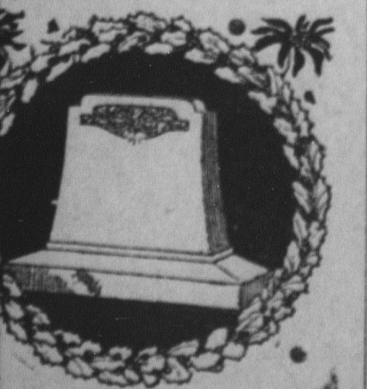
