**PROTESTS WIN BAN ON 40 ONE-MAN LIQUOR SHOPS.**  
Ben G. Heisel, acting secretary of the Liquor Control Board, said the board has canceled plans to put one-man liquor stores in 40 or 50 communities because of protests from dry groups.

He declined to name the towns, saying the list is not completed. The board plans to open 250 one-man stores within a few weeks. "It is the policy of the board to base our selections for sites on the vote on repeal of prohibition in 1933," Heisel said. "We will not put a store in a community that voted dry in 1933 and where a protest is received. However, in communities that voted wet, we investigate very carefully before we cancel plans for a store because of protests from dry groups."

The same situation applies to communities that have voted to permit licensed beer and liquor places within their boundaries, Heisel said. He added that local option votes do not affect the State Liquor stores, and that a store in a community which votes dry will not be closed.
