Funeral services were held from the late home Saturday afternoon, the Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick, in the absence of Rev. D. R. Keener, officiating. Interment was made at Centre Hall.

A son of William and Lydia Stamm Meyer, the deceased was born August 17, 1849. He leaves the following children: Mrs. Robert Smith, Mrs. Harry Moyer, Wilbur, Albert, John and Orvis, all of Centre Hall, and Mrs. William Knoffsinger, of Pleasant Gap. A sister, Mrs. George Nearhood, of State College, and a brother, Frank Meyer, of El Reno, Oklahoma, also survive.

He was married to Anna Maria Smetsler, who died a number of years ago. He was a member of the Reformed church at Centre Hall.

KLINE.—Mrs. Anna C. Kline, of Lemont, aged 71 years, 5 months and 15 days, succumbed to complications Tuesday morning after an illness lasting three weeks.

Born March 28, 1864 in Buffalo Run Valley, she was the daughter of William and Mary Witmer and was married March 12, 1878, to John H. Kline, who preceded her in death August 5, 1925. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

DEMOCRACY CROSSES A NEW FRONTIER IN FINANCE

[Philada. Record, Editorial]—Now that the Eccles Banking Bill has been signed by President Roosevelt and become the law of the land, we are free to say why it was signed.

Because the big bankers who controlled the pursestrings of the nation had the effrontery to tell President Roosevelt what he could and could not do if he expected them to finance the Government.

The Eccles Banking Bill is his answer. It gives the Government control of its own financing and, therefore, completes the sovereignty of this great democracy.

Roosevelt has fulfilled the pledge of his inaugural address to "drive the money-changers out of the temple,"—the temple in this case being the "inalienable" right of the people to control their own destiny free from dictation by the bankers.

When President Roosevelt signed the banking bill he inaugurated a new epoch in the history of the United States.

He established the principle that control of credit is as much a function of government as control of coinage.

Heretofore, when Uncle Sam wanted money, he had to go, hat in hand, to the bankers who controlled the credit of the nation through the Federal Reserve System.
