PUBLIC SCHOOLS EXEMPTED FROM TAX ON AMUSEMENTS

In ruling on the controversial provisions of the emergency relief tax on amusements, passed by the 1935 legislature, affecting educational institutions, revenue secretary Harry E. Kalodner approved the recommendations of the department counsel that private schools, colleges and universities should be subject to the tax and public and parochial schools exempted. The exemption applies to both grade and high schools.
