The validity of the graduated income tax law forced through the last legislature by the Democrats, is now before the State Supreme Court and September 30th has been set as the date for argument. The measure was used to relieve tax on real estate, the court's decision is unfavorable, tax on real estate will not be relieved. This furnishes another reason for taxpayers to vote for revision of the constitution, so that if the courts declare the graduated income tax unconstitutional, the constitution, when revised, can be so written that such a law can be made operative. The new law affects only persons whose income is \$40,000 and over per year.

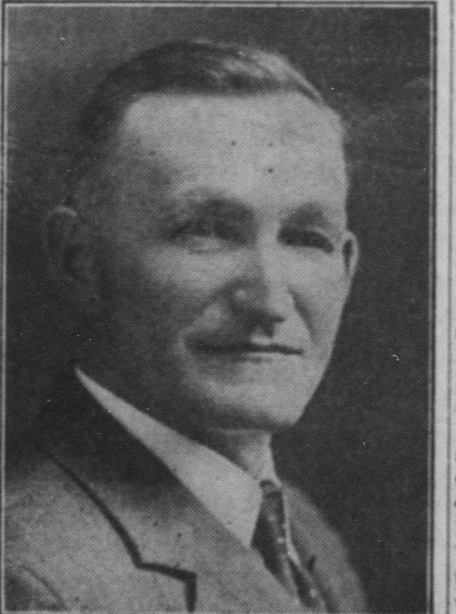

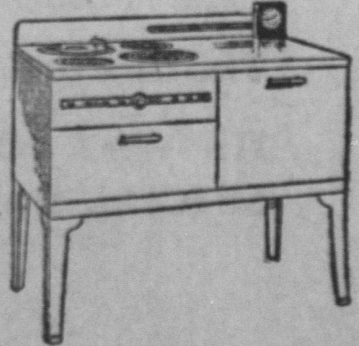
