STATE COLLEGE WINS THE CENTRE COUNTY BASEBALL LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1935 championship of the Centre County Baseball League is in possession of State College as a result of a sparkling 6-1 victory over Bellefonte Thursday evening—the third victory for the Collegians in the five-game series between the first- and second-half champions to determine the season's title winner.

A 13-hit attack that blasted George Cushman, husky Titan righthander, off the mound in the seventh inning, was combined with errorless defensive play and a gilt-edged mound performance by Fred Gearhart, College right-hander who, last Saturday, was batted out of the box, to earn State College the triumph, and with it the championship. Also contributing to one of the Collegians' six tallies were two of Bellefonte's four errors.

First game—State College, 14; Bellefonte, 2. Second game—State College, 6; Bellefonte, 4. Third game—Bellefonte, 8; State College, 5.

PENN STATE TEAM WINS JUDGING CHAMPIONSHIP

Penn State won the livestock judging championship at the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield, Mass., last week. It was the tenth victory for a Penn State team in the intercollegiate contest since 1921.

Harvey M. Russell, of New Kensington, was high man in the whole contest with 331 points, and M. Maxwell Smith, of Rea, ranked second with an even 300 score. Ward W. Studebaker, Pittsburgh, stood seventh with 766 points.

Other members of the squad were William P. Campbell, Centre Hall; Karl P. Catterall, Pittsburgh; Walter S. Babler, Hazelton; and Samuel F. Simmons, Austin. In 1921 Penn State livestock judges started a string of three consecutive victories. They won again in the alternate years of 1925, 1927 and 1929. Three consecutive championships were added from 1931 to 1933.
