MAKE FILTERED CIDER—A very clear and immensely superior cider for the market can be made by filtering. Equipment for the process may be constructed at home for a cost probably not exceeding \$2 or \$3.

KEEP FLOCK RECORDS—Poultry records tell the story of profit or loss. Record-keeping puts the poultry enterprise on a business basis.

STAGE PULLING CONTEST—The first World's Stallion Pulling Contest will be staged at Crete, Ill., October 12. Discovery of the finest young draft sires is the object of the contest.

PRUNE PINE TREES—Future timber values will be enhanced by timely pruning of planted read and white pines. When the young trees are 12 to 15 feet high the thickest, straightest trees not less than 12 feet apart each way may be pruned.
